Latest Theory is That She Was Taken to Eastman's Bungalow Without Knowing Place.

LURED TO DEATH?

IT WAS NOT HALF FINISHED.

Alleged Murderer's Body Burled Near Scene of Crime-Wife Did Not Attend Funeral.

St. Michaels, Md., June 27 .--- The. theory that Edith May Woodill was lured to "Lame Bob" Eastman's lonebungalow without knowledge of where she was going, and that she we ϵ drugged and detained there against her will was advanced today when a further search of the shack which the superstitious folks of the neighborhood forever more will shun as haunted, revealed a small bottle which contained a mixture of narcotle drugs. This cd a mixture of narcolic drugs. This tends to bear out the theory which the people of the community who knew and loved the girl long have wanted to believe. They never have listened to the suggestion that she was in-volved in a drunken orgy at the bun-galow and have contenerd that she lost her life in repulsing the advances of the man who acknowledged his guilt by killing himself when near capture. capture

EASTMAN ONLY SUSPECT.

Today's investigation led the au-ficilies still further way from the fidea that any one other than East-man could have invited friends from New York or from any other place to visit his bungalow in the condition it was in. The place, only half com-pleted, offered no accommodations for visitors whatsoever. A single bed, poorly fitted up; a table and a wash-stand completed its equipment of furniture.
