YOUTHFUL BANDITS

ARE DISORGANIZED

"Highway Robbers' Union" Lands in Juvenile Court—Much Plunder Recovered.

The Highway Robbers' Union was dissolved yesterday afternoon by Judge Gowans of the juvenile court, when he sent its chieftain and two members to the detention home. The gang consisted of 12 boys ranging in age from 9 to 12 years old. Several of them are now in hiding, but the probation officers hope to round up the young bandits and get them back into their operations.

With signs they carried on to secrecy and they were sworn to secrecy under the most stringent rules. They wore badges as evidence of their rank, and held their meetings in old barns, vacant houses and in the open near the foot hills.

Leroy Corbett, 11 years old, who is chief of the band, is now in the detention home and Ben J. Rydman, 9 years old, and Leonard Powell, 12 years old, are also in custody. While they talked freely of the organization of the gang they refused to give the names of the other boys.

The officers have recovered a shotgun, fishing tackle, a machinist's hammer, a punch, two shield badges, some silver leaf and several other articles which were stolen from the Salt Lake Stamp company. The plunder from a feed store at 130 south Third West street was also recovered in an old barn, and the boys met and where they buried their loot. An effort will be made to capture the other members of the gang.
