OWN SALARIES. Councilmen Consider What Their

Services Are Worth to the Municipality.

FIXED AT \$600 WITH EXTRAS.

#### Firemens' Relief Fund to be Invested-Consolidated Gets Another Franchise.

After the routine business of the city council had been attended to last evening, the council took up the consideration of the revised ordinances. The most important matter considered under that head was the ordinance fixing the salary of councilmen. The revised ordinance increases the salary from \$420 per annum to \$720. Eardley, who is a retiring councilman, thought that the increase was entirely too great and moved, as an amendment, that the salary be fixed at \$500 per annum. Black favored \$720 per year, as did Daveler, who will also retire from the council at the end of the year. Fernstrom favored \$720 and extra compensation for the members when they sit as a board of canvassers or as a board of equalization of water rates. He thought that they should each receive \$5 per day for the former service and \$3 per day for the latter.

Thomas offered an amendment that the salary be fixed at \$600, with extra compensation as indicated by Fernstrom. Sharp and Robinson were in favor of the increase in salary, but they did not see how the city could afford it. The amendment offered by Thomas was finally carried, so the salary of the councilmen after the first of the year will be \$600 per year each and \$3 per day when they sit on the board of equalization and \$5 per day for their services on the board of canvassers.

#### FIREMEN'S FUND.

Upon the recommendation of the fire committee, Chief Devine was given au-thority to invest the firemen's relief fund, amounting to \$2.579.85, under the supervision of the committee. Chief Devine was present at the meeting last hight, and in relation to the fund he said that he hoped the next Legislature would increase it and nut if on a part would increase it and put it on a per-manent basis as in other states, so that old or permanently disabled fire-men could be retired on a pension.

ANOTHER FRANCHISE.

The council, by a unanimous vote, passed an ordinance granting a fran-chise to the Consolidated Railway and Power company to construct a line on Third West street from First South to North Temple street and thence west over the proposed new viaduct on that street.

APPOINTMENTS CONFIRMED.

The police and prison committee recommended that the appointment of C. B. Tanner, as a special policeman at the Novelty Theater to serve with-out pay from the city, be confirmed. The report was adopted.

Capt. Burbidge sent in the appoint-ment of Joseph Slater as a special policeman at the Short Line depot to serve without pay from the city. The appointment was confirmed unani-
