

resolutions and speeches in Indiana were endorsed by the people, but that his administration was not insensible to the necessity of vigilance. Whether the stories were true or false he should not, in case of emergency, hesitate to exercise his constitutional authority, though at the same time he could not see any occasion for what he termed the indiscrete manipulations of the democratic local leaders, and doubted if they were inspired by any higher authority. It was a grave responsibility for any body of men to stir up domestic violence and array themselves against the general government. Whoever was declared by the President of the Senate to be elected President and Vice-President of the United States it would be his duty to recognize them and to surrender them the reins of authority, and this he would do, but he protested that he had no wish to force any particular person upon the people, but would see the one declared elected his successor was placed in possession. He was not to be the judge of the election, that was to be decided by the constitution and laws. The President then went on to say that all he had done before and since the election was to see that the laws were obeyed and peace maintained, and he should continue to see that was done until the last moment of his official life. He said he was gratified to see the conservative temper in Congress, especially among men from the south, and he believed this spirit would prevail throughout the country. The President was in unusual good spirits to-day, and talked quite freely, but he had no objections whatever to his views being made public.

The Panama Star and Herald of December 8th, received by steamer, says a great battle had taken place at Garrapta. The trenches of the revolutionists were taken by our forces, commanded by Generals Acosta and Camargo. An armistice of three days were asked for by the rebels to bury 2,000 dead of both sides. Our forces cut off the retreat of the rebels to Antiquia. If the rebels do not surrender at discretion they will remain in the power of our army. On the 21st of November Gen. Ireguillo occupied Manizale.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, 17.—A fire this afternoon destroyed the U. P. Transfer house, U. P. baggage room, telegraph and ticket offices, and ticket offices of the C. R. and I. and P., C. B. and Q., N. W. and C. B. and St. Joe Railroads. Daniel Duffey, car repairer perished in the hotel. Loss not known.

WASHINGTON, 17. Elkanaba Ingalls and his wife, occupying a house alone on a public street, were suffocated this morning. They had left a lighted lamp on the bureau on going to bed. The bureau took fire, and the old couple perished before reaching the door.

Representative Stephens, of Georgia, over his own signature, says the statement that he is advising the friendly acceptance by the people of the South, of the inauguration of Hayes, is utterly unfounded.

The Washington Capitol, to-day, professes to have information that as there is no law requiring the presiding officer of the Senate to be chosen from among the members of that body, the republican senators have determined to elect Gen. Grant to that position in case of need, and thus make him President of the United States until his successor is inaugurated. The Capitol says this deep-laid scheme of desperate men means revolution, and it, therefore, in two vehement editorials, calls on the people to arm for the conflict. It also intimates that it would be easy to enter Pennsylvania Avenue with 100,000 democratic volunteer soldiers to prevent Hayes' inauguration.

WORCESTER, Mass., 18.—Sumner Flagg, lost his life by the burning of a house and barn this morning. Five others were considerably burned before escaping from the house.

WASHINGTON, 18.—It is understood that all the political correspondence has been compiled and verified in the confidential office of the Western Union Telegraph Co., and is ready for production should the demand be pressed to compulsion.

NEW YORK, 18.—The trial of the Emma Company against Park, Baxter, and Stewart, was resumed this morning. Parks counsel made a long argument, in which he held that Park was not responsible for

Grant's acts. He said Grant acted as his agent. That by contract Grant had to pay all the expenses, and that if there was any liability it rested with Grant and his agents.

The Evening Post says it is reported that the World is to be conducted as an independent political journal after the first of January.

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

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
