Centenary Dinner—A Big Thief.

BOSTON, 5.—The O'Connell dinner at the Rensselaer House was a great affair to-night. It was participated in by a large number of public men. Speeches were made by General Banks, Butler, Quincy and others.

A Detective arrived to-day with Wm. G. Carson, arrested at St. Louis, charged with embezzling \$150,000 worth of goods from the store of the pork packing company of J. P. Squires & Co., at East Chicago, a year ago. Carson left here Saturday, and has been largely interested in the pork business at St. Louis. He has been locked in jail, waiting further action.

Estimated Loss by Floods.

INDIANAPOLIS, 5.—No very reliable estimate of the aggregate loss to the wheat, corn and other crops in the state can be made now. Some sections put in the damage at 50 per cent, others much higher, and in many places the entire crop is destroyed. The most reliable information shows that the loss in the wheat crop alone has been put at \$10,000,000. In the low lands on the Indiana river it has been put at \$20,000,000. The corn crop is wholly destroyed by the flood, which at \$1 per acre, would amount to \$3,000,000.

Estimated Loss by Floods.

INDIANAPOLIS, 5.—The river is slowly rising. The Express this morning, estimates the loss to crops and property in 14 counties tributary to this city at not less than \$15,000,000. There is profound discouragement turning all classes.

C., 5.—Ex-State treasurer Carter, against whom a warrant for \$10,000 was recently issued, has been growing out of his criminal friends and embezzlements, who was in prison awaiting prosecution for slaying offenses, has escaped from the Columbia jail, and there is no clue; every effort is being made to recapture him.

State Fined.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., 5.—At noon, to-day, the national flag was hoisted over the capitol, and 21 guns were fired in honor of the carrying of the convention by the people by a majority estimated at from 75,000 to 100,000.
