up and it seed soon begins to grow and harvest in and a sufficient growth will be secured before frost to turn under a good layer as a fertilizer. If desired, in anything like a fair season, a good crop of grain may be secured. However, it makes a good feed for winter, as the grain can be fed as a change to nearly all kinds of stock to advantage.

Of the three root crops, say: Turnip, Turnip, from which the Turnip is produced, rutabagas should be sown first, as they require longer time to make a good growth than the others.
