LOCAL BRIEFS.

E. A. Kirby, for the last two years clerk of the Kenyon hotel, leaves October 10, to return to his home at Omaha, Neb.

Fort Douglas is a very busy scene these days, with roadways and sidewalks torn up, and new improvements in progress in many directions.

Arthur Van Meter, lately of this city who became noted because of his 40 days fast to cure dropsy, has just returned to Meadville, Pa., at the age of 49. He leaves a wife and three children.

The semi-annual meeting of the State Beekeepers association will be held at the city and county building, October 5 at 4:30 p. m. The world's fair exhibit will be one of the subjects discussed.

An interruption to the current over the high tension wire of the Light & Power company from Cottonwood, cut off the street railway current between 1 and 2 yesterday afternoon, and for an hour in the evening. The difficulty was removed.

An interesting musical program was given yesterday afternoon, in the old St. Mark's schoolhouse by Dr. and Mrs. Broadbeck of the Conservatory of Music. The concert was so well received that the program is to be repeated next Sunday afternoon.

The funeral of Ferdinand D. Rehmann will be held from the Catholic cathedral tomorrow at 2 p. m., with interment at Mt. Olivet. The deceased was a member of the Knights of Pythias and Woodmen, and members of these orders will attend the services.

There was a large attendance yesterday afternoon, in the Tabernacle when Prof. McClellan gave an organ recital, as it was Fast day and no regular services were held. The overture to Tannhauser was played with the artist's usual skill, and produced quite an impression on the visitors.

A dozen or more persons and concerns from over the state have lately filed applications with the state engineer for water for mining and power purposes. One of the largest applicants is A. W. Stephenson and L. C. Prosser, who want 70 second feet of water. Hot Springs lake to be used in irrigating near the stockyards.

Recruiting offices, under the direction of Capt. Winn of the Twelfth Infantry, will be opened early in the month in this city and at Ogden, to fill up the ranks of the infantry and artillery at Fort Douglas, which are thinning out by reason of expiration of terms of enlistment. When the commands there are recruited, new men will be sent to Fort Russell.

First Lieut. N. M. Falls of the Twelfth Infantry has been promoted to a captaincy, and the promotion takes him into the Thirtieth Infantry. As he is much attached to the Twelfth, Capt. Falls will ask for a transfer to his old regiment. He was commissioned second lieutenant of the Eighteenth Infantry in July 1898, and was made first lieutenant in the Twelfth on March of the following year. He is from North Carolina, and served with credit in the Philippines.

A couple of drunken men driving a spirited team of horses met with an accident on Third West and Second South street last evening that resulted in the death of one of the horses. The men were driving in a reckless manner when one of the horses suddenly fell to the ground and was instantly killed. The animal's neck was broken. The men hastily cut the harness from the dead horse and made their escape down the street. The police were unable to locate them.

CAUSE OF SUICIDE.

Because of Gossip Among Her Associates, Norah Collins Took Strychnine.

The Soda Springs, (Ida.) Chieftain has the following concerning the suicide of Miss Norah Collins which occurred at the Cullen hotel in this city last week:

H. D. Collins, the father of Norah Collins, came up from the valley Thursday to make arrangements for the disposition of the remains. He gave some additional information relating to the wanderings of his daughter, and the probable cause for her rash act.

He said that she had been employed at a hotel in Montpelier during the summer, but was induced by a companion to go to Pocatello, where better wages could be obtained. Afterward she went to Logan and from there to Salt Lake. He had heard nothing of her whereabouts from the time of her departure for Logan until the message telling of her death reached him at Bench Tuesday afternoon.

A year or so ago the girl was involved in a sensational criminal assault case with one Wilson, who was convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary by the district court. The recollections of the revolting scenes at the trial and the comments that were afterward made by her associates in the valley so preyed upon her that in desperation she finally left her home to seek employment among strangers.
