

ed the package. Upon opening it, Mr. Bernhardt discovered checks, coupons and other papers of the apparent value of nearly \$1,000,000. The checks were mostly made out to the order of Messrs. MacIvaine Bro. of No. 53 Broadway. Mr. Bernhardt concluded that the package was the proceeds of a robbery, and decided to investigate the matter. He discovered that the original firm of MacIvaine & Bro. was no longer in existence but that one of its members, Reed E. MacIvaine was doing business. When visited by the deputy marshal and shown the package Mr. MacIvaine expressed unbounded astonishment. He acknowledged the contents of the package to be of great value and said he had thought that it had been securely locked up in his safe. Inspector Ryan will investigate the matter this morning.

CHICAGO, 7.—The Chicago and Western Railroad has re-elected its old directors and officers.

A San Antonio special says: A terrible explosion in tunnel No. 1 on the G. P. and T. Railway extension, occurred yesterday, 250 kegs of blasting powder being touched off by workmen on the east end of the extension, the workmen at the west end were at once overwhelmed with earth, rocks and trees; three men were killed and five wounded.

NEW YORK, 7.—Western Union earnings show an increase of \$380,000 for five months of this year.

The Tribune's Washington special says: The renewed rumors of Mr. Lowell's return are without foundation. There is excellent authority for saying that Lowell has not been recalled and has not resigned, and that no name is being considered in his place.

#### FOREIGN.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 5.—Besides Dervish Pasha, commissioner, and Lebi Bey, as assistant commissioner, Ashmed Essad Effendi, second assistant commissioner, and Bilmey Bey, a teacher to the commission, sailed for Cairo. All foreign ambassadors were summoned to the Porte last evening, and informed of the dispatch of the commission, with the object of endeavoring to effect a reconciliation between the Khedive and Arabi Pasha, and to restore order.

Lord Dufferin, British minister, telegraphed the Earl of Granville, in view of the Sultan's action in sending a commission to Egypt, a postponement of the conference was desirable.

A rumor is current that the Porte has dispatched circulars to the powers, in which it endeavors to show that a conference would be inopportune. Said Pasha, minister of foreign affairs, when receiving the ambassadors last evening, expressed himself to a similar effect.

QUEBEC, 4.—Princess Louise arrived last night in the *Sarmatian*. Her Royal Highness is in excellent health. The mayor read a congratulatory address in French, and in the same language Her Royal Highness responded, expressing the pleasure she had in returning to Canada. Louise was plainly attired in a very narrow striped gray waterproof ulster and hat trimmed with black satin and plush. The only ornaments were small earrings and a pair of pearls. The Princess enjoyed the voyage very much, suffering very little from seasickness. The Princess was loudly cheered as the vessel approached the wharf.

ROME, 5.—The French Chamber of Deputies adjourned as a mark of mourning, produced an excellent impression.

Ricciotti Garibaldi and Major Canzo arrived at Caprera. Preparations for the cremation of the remains are suspended. The doctors are expected to arrive this evening.

LONDON, Ont., 5.—Within a mile of Avon, reside a venerable man named George Norris, the oldest man in this district, having passed his 103d birthday. He is still hale and hearty, and thinks seriously of emigrating to the northwest the ensuing summer to take up land. At 75 years of age Mr. Norris was in his prime, and celebrated his 100th birthday by cutting half a cord of wood and husking corn the balance of the day. His age can be verified by old settlers here. Norris comes of a long lived family. His grandfather lived to be 105 and dropped dead while plowing in a field on his farm. His grandmother was 107 at the time of her death, and walked four miles to make a visit before her demise. His own father lived to be 103, and his mother has a brother living at Port Huron, who is a

smart old man, yet able to enjoy a ride on the cars.

BERLIN, 5.—Prince Henry, son of Crown Prince Frederick William will visit America in October.

TORONTO, Ontario, 5.—At a political meeting at the Amphitheatre, Sir John McDonald said: I am opposed to Chinese labor in America, for I do not think it is for the permanent interest of Canada to bring in semi-barbarians to work out and supersede white labor." (A voice, "How is it they do come?")

"Well, they do come, and so do rats. I am pledged to build the great Pacific railway in five years and if I cannot obtain white labor, I must employ other."

LONDON, 5.—In the Commons, in committee on the repression bill, Harcourt consented to insert provisions assuring prompt trial, causing the judges for the special court to be selected by ballot in stead of being appointed, and obliging the judges to state their reasons for conviction in open court.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 6.—Osman Pasha and other officers condemned by court martial in Egypt, are confined in a palace here and forbidden communication with the outer world.

DUBLIN, 6.—The harvest prospects in the counties of Longford, Westmeath, Roscommon and Kings are excellent. Rents are being paid everywhere. The reduction is about equivalent to that made in the land court and is being unanimously granted.

LONDON, 6.—It is said orders for cessation of work on the fortifications arrived too late, as the fortifications had been completed.

Four hundred university students attacked and wrecked the offices of the clerical newspapers, the *Cassandrina* and the *Voces Della Veritas*, because the former had spoken disrespectfully of Garibaldi.

ATHENS, 6.—A resolution has been passed by the Chamber of Deputies, expressing their grief at the death of Garibaldi and requesting the government to instruct the Greek minister at Rome to attend the funeral and present a wreath of flowers on behalf of the Greek people.

ROME, 6.—Large numbers of persons are starting from all parts of Italy for Caprera to be present at the funeral of Garibaldi. A steamer left Genoa Monday with 300 veterans on board. Four steamers have started from Palermo, two from Leghorn and one from Naples, crowded. The supply of boats is inadequate to accommodate those desiring to go. Influence is being exerted with the members of Garibaldi's family for the transfer of his ashes to the mainland.

The Duke of Genoa and four masters of ceremonies will represent King Humbert at the funeral of Garibaldi.

LONDON, 7.—It is stated the German representatives, after an audience with the Sultan today, informed the British Ambassador that the Sultan would sustain Tewfik Pasha, loyally and energetically. He also stated that the military leaders, at a meeting in Arabi Pasha's house at Cairo, decided to observe the expectant attitude until the Turkish commissioner discloses the Sultan's intentions, and that should the Sultan attempt to maintain Tewfik Pasha in power, the military party are resolved to wreak vengeance on the Khedive even at the cost of their lives.

Four more English ironclads are on the way to Alexandria.

LONDON, 7.—Davitt, in a speech at Liverpool last night, said he was in favor of the land becoming national property. He considered that the soil of Ireland could be purchased for the tenants for 140 million pounds in government bonds, repayable in fifty years. He denounced the Dublin Castle rule as a monstrous failure.

QUEENSTOWN, 7.—The Guion Line steamer *p Alaska*, from New York, made the passage in six days 9 hours and 25 minutes, which is two hours faster than her own previous and hitherto best time.

MADRID, 7.—The Chamber of Deputies agreed to the bill providing for the gradual reduction of the custom tariff.

CAIRO, 8.—The Turkish mission comprises fifty eight persons. It is understood that the leaders of the military party intend to apply to Dervish Pasha, to effect a reconciliation between themselves and the Khedive.

LONDON, 8.—The liabilities of the suspended firm of James Thompson & Co., ship and insurance brokers of London, amount to £100,000, those of Vaughan & Co., merchants of Liverpool, to £200,000.

CETTINJE, 8.—An Austrian battalion was attacked on the 20th inst., by 200 insurgents, near Maribor. The Austrians were surprised and compelled to retreat, with a loss of 95 killed. The insurgents lost 26 killed and wounded. On the 31st inst. the insurgents destroyed the Austrian barracks at Bischna, killing 25 of the troops; the rest fled.
