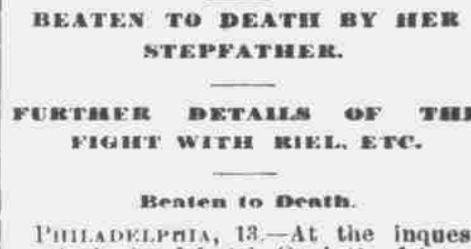

Our loss, I am afraid, is heavy, but not so heavy as might be expected. A few men were killed, some severely wounded. The killed are: Captain French, commanding the scouts; Lieut. Greaves, commanding the company of Boulton's scouts; and W. Rippen, sergeant-major's scouts, and Private Wheeler of the 90th Battalion. The wounded are: Lieut. Gordon, scout-major's scouts; Major Davidson, 16th Grenadiers; Major Watson, 16th Grenadiers; a slightly injured Sergeant Major Watson, 90th Battalion; and two privates, Sergeant Jakes, 16th battalion in the hands of the enemy, and Private Young, 90th battalion, less seriously wounded in the thigh; Private W.
