## COURT SUSTAINS FERRY DEMURRER

Judge Marshall Settles Litigation Against Estate Which Has Dragged for Seven Years.

NEARLY \$1,000,000 INVOLVED.

History of Case Began Thirty Years Ago With the Death of William Montague, Ferry.

In the federal court yesterday, Judge John A. Marshall sustained the demurral of the representatives of the estate of Edward P. Ferry in the suit of the Michigan Trust company for the sum of \$100,000 and interest for a period of nearly 20 years, making in all the sum of approximately \$1,000,000.

Providing that the trust company does not appeal the case to the United States circuit court of appeals, this decision will settle the litigation against this estate, which has dragged along for the last seven years.

The history of the case begins at the death of William Montague Ferry, about 30 years ago. He was a pioneer of Michigan and a missionary among the Indians. Seizing the opportunities that presented themselves in a business way, Mr. Ferry became wealthy. On his death, Edward P. Ferry, son, father of W. Mont Ferry and E. S. Ferry of Salt Lake City, was appointed executor of the estate. He paid all the legacies of the deceased, William M. Ferry, and there was a residue estate of \$100,000. It was this amount that he left to the trust company with interest that the present dispute has been waged owing to the fact that the records of the probate court of Grand Rapids do not show a final settlement of this residuary estate.

AUTHORIZED TO PAY DEBTS.

The executor, Edward P. Ferry, through his representatives, claims that this amount was all used in payment of his brother's debts and that he was authorized to do so by written assignments of the heirs and that the records of a court in equity show this fact though the payment is not recorded in the probate court.

The suit was started about 7 years ago by the descendants of the daughter of William Montague Ferry who left the bequests. About 15 months ago the probate court at Grand Rapids gave judgment to the Michigan Trust company, representing the heirs, in the sum of approximately \$1,000,000, against the estate of Edward P. Ferry of this city. Suit in this judgment was filed against the estate in Utah as there was no property left in Michigan.

The brother to whom it is claimed that \$100,000 was paid is the late Senator Thomas W. Ferry, of Michigan. He was in politics having represented his state in both houses of Congress.
