

JORDAN RIVER LIGHT PLANT.

Pile Driving Will Commence There
Some Time Next Week.

TO BE BIG CENTRAL STATION

Work Delayed by Hardly Delivered
Machinery Orders—Now Un-
loading Ten Cars.

Next week the Utah Light & Power company is to commence pile driving at the intersection of South Temple street and the Jordan river for its new central station which will add about 2,000 horsepower to its present capacity. This will be the big central station of all the company's plants and will give great relief to its present strained conditions.

The company is now unloading ten cars of machinery, the most of which was ordered in the west in February last. It was due here on Aug. 1. This shows how difficult it is to get orders through within any reasonable period of time. And conditions are even worse now than they were a year ago. It is now considered well out of the question to get an order of great size filled in less than 12 months. This fact is causing many big concerns to anticipate all their needs accordingly. Among them is the Utah Light & Power, which is placing orders now for one year ahead. The demand for electric light and power in Salt Lake this season has been altogether unexpected and unprecedented and it is conceded that ample provision must be made for the future as the demand will be larger and larger all the time. Take the street car system alone—it has exceeded all calculations as to its needs, and the growth of its business is increasing.

CONDEMNED MEN TO BE HEARD.

Lynch and King Case Coming Up Before Judge Booth Oct. 10.

AWAITING DEATH PENALTY

Ray Knight Murder Case to Be Heard On Question of New Trial on October 18.

James Lynch and Robert L. King, who two years ago next month were convicted of murder in the first degree for the killing of Godfrey Prowse in the Sheep Branch gambling house, and who were sentenced to be shot for the crime, will be brought before Judge Booth, who presided at their trial, in the Third district court on Friday, Oct. 10, at 10 o'clock at which time the arguments on a motion for a new trial will be heard and sentence will again be passed upon them.

The order for the hearing on the motion was made by Judge Booth this morning upon the request of Dist. Atty. Eichnor. The defendants were convicted in November, and the later sentence to be shot upon a date to be hereafter fixed by the court. The date for the execution has never been set. The case was appealed to the supreme court and the judgment of the lower court was affirmed.

A motion for a new trial was made upon the ground of newly discovered evidence and a number of affidavits were filed in support of the motion. This motion was today set for hearing upon the above date and an order was made to have the defendants brought into court on the date.

RELEASED FROM CUSTODY. Judge Moore today dismissed the case of the state vs. James King, the convicted man charged with the robbery of a pocket book containing \$29 in cash and a certificate of deposit on McCormick & Co's bank for \$15, all the property of Nick Weber. The crime was committed on April 23, 1932. The court dismissed the case upon the motion of District Attorney Eichnor, who stated that, owing to the absence of important witnesses from the state, he did not think the testimony as it now stands sufficient for a conviction. The prisoner was ordered released from custody.

PLEADS GUILTY. Fred Daniels, who on Sept. 8, 1932, stole a horse, bicyclo and harness valued at \$115 from John H. Bailey, was arraigned before Judge Moore this morning on the charge of grand larceny and entered a plea of guilty. Judge Moore sentenced him to the state prison for passing sentence upon Daniels.

ROY KATHIN MURDER CASE. The hearing of the motion for a new trial in the case of the state vs. Merrill M. Kathin, who was on Sept. 27, convicted of voluntary manslaughter for the killing of Willard S. Haynes at the Eastford hotel on Nov. 24, 1931, was set by Judge Moore this morning for Saturday, Oct. 15, at 10 o'clock, and the time for passing sentence was postponed.

Such action was taken upon the request of Frank Hoffman, one of defendant's attorneys, who stated that the other attorneys for the defense were unable to be present in court today and hence could not argue the motion for a new trial.

The defendant was brought into court by Deputy Sheriff Taylor, and Cummings in company with three other prisoners. He appeared about the same as he did during the trial. His father, Cal. Kohn, was the only relative present. Only one juror who sat on the case was present in court to hear the proceedings, namely, Edward White, and very few spectators were present.

The motion for a new trial was filed yesterday afternoon and is based upon the following grounds:

First—That the verdict is contrary to law.

Second—That the verdict is contrary to the evidence introduced at the trial; and

Third—That the verdict was rendered by other than a fair expression of the opinion on the part of all the jurors.

COURT NOTES. In the divorce case of Ellen Christie vs. Bert Christie, Judge Hall today ordered defendant to pay plaintiff \$50 as costs of the trial, and \$100 as attorney's fees and \$10 per week until paid.

Judge Stewart today rendered judgment for \$25.40 and costs of suit in favor of the plaintiff, the Utah Savings & Loan company, against the defendant, M. Dull vs. the Mammoth Mining company and Samuel McIntyre. The action was brought to recover the above amount for services rendered by plaintiff in transcribing the testimony in the case of the Grand Central Mining company vs. the Mammoth Mining company.

Thomas H. Frame was granted a divorce by Judge Hall, from a deal with Madge Frame on the ground of desertion. The parties were married in Denver on July 6, 1930, and defendant deserted her husband on April 25, 1932.

Judge Hall today appointed George H. Smith administrator of the estate of Spiro Dockless, deceased, under bonds in the sum of \$10,000.

The will of the late James McGuffie, deceased, was admitted to probate today by Judge Hall and the Utah Savings & Loan company was appointed administrator with the will annexed.

Under the terms of the will the entire estate is bequeathed to his wife Isabelle McGuffie and after her death, \$2,000 is bequeathed to the seven grand children of deceased who reside in California; \$7,500 to Joseph McGuffie, the son of deceased who resides in Nevada; \$500 to Julia Letcher, a grand daughter; and to his three daughters he bequeaths \$1 each.

In the case of Emma Parsons vs. Thomas C. Patten, Judge Stewart today rendered judgment in favor of defendant. The action was brought to recover \$65 as damages for the alleged wrongful possession of a certain house by the plaintiff claimed title.

WE TERN UNION STRIKE. Messenger Boys Walk Out of Local Office Today.

The Western Union messenger boys this afternoon piled their coats and caps in a heap and walked out of the office heedless of the scores of calls that were waiting.

There are two reasons given for this proceeding—one by the boys and the other by the management. The boys claim that they went out because they did not approve of the system of having their pay for the day.

The version of Manager Twiford, however, throws some light on the matter. According to Mr. Twiford a messenger boy named Frederickson, who is known as captain of the messengers, declined to go out and deliver an important telegram, giving as his reason that he would sooner answer the calls.

Manager Twiford promptly gave him two minutes in which to make up his mind. The boy stayed with his ultimatum with the result that he was discharged. Other messengers then promptly demanded that he be reinstated. Upon their request not being complied with they all went out.

It is stated that he is not working about the strike, as there are plenty more boys in town. The boys, however, state that they will "thump the stuffing out" of any boy who undertakes to fill their places.
