PHOTOGRAPHS OF MARS LIKE A PINHEAD

The American magazine contains a popular scientific article entitled "The Case Against Mars," and the author is Harold Jacoby, professor of es-tronomy in Columbia University. Pro-fessor Jacoby denies that we know enough about Mars to warrant even a gross that the plannet is inhabited Wo enough about Mars to warrant even a guess that the plannet is inhabited. We don't even know that there are any markings or canals on Mars, he says. The exact size of Professor Lovell's photographs of Mars is three-sixteenths of an inch in diameter, and even this is after the largest magnification in the telescone. The original photographs

after the largest magnification in the telescope. The original photographs are the size of a pinhead. "All this photographic experimenta-tion, therefore, has not yet resulted in good pictures more than the original three-sixteenths of an inch in diameter and produced by purely photographic process, though somewhat larger nega-tives may possibly be made in the fu-ture. All larger published pictures have been produced from hand drawings, and are therefore simply visual observa-tions. The alleged photographic verifi-cations have been made by the same observers who have studied Mars in the telescope—trained observers. They have

telescope-trained observers. They have observed their tiny protographs; again the eye, optic nerve and brain wero brought to play, and exactly the same
