Last Monday in the Month Made The Regular Salary Pay Day.

STATE ENCAMPMENT C. A. R.

Final Arrangements for Memorable Day—Wedding Bells—Big Damage Suit Against U. P.

Ogden, May 8.—The Union Pacific Railroad company has been made defendant in a \$50,000 damage suit filed by Frank A. Nolan, who sues for the sum named as compensation for personal injuries received by him in a collision which occurred November 11, 1904, at Anna station, Wyo. The plaintiff alleged that his right arm was torn off, his left wrist was broken and shattered, both legs were cut and bruised, and other permanent injuries were received by him.

HARRY MOSS SENTENCED.

Harry Moss was sentenced by Judge Howell to 10 months in the county jail, having been found guilty 10 days ago of involuntary manslaughter. The maximum punishment for that crime is one year in the county jail, which no doubt the prisoner would have received had it not been that he is a young married man, and his wife sat by his side, which caused the judge to show defendant some leniency. The crime for which Moss will spend 10 months in the county jail was committed June 10, 1904, at the Hermitage in Ogden canyon, where Moss had an altercation with William E. Stone, the 20-year-old son of Louis F. Stone; in the fight Moss stabbed

bed young Stone in the neck, severing an artery, which resulted in his death, in a few hours. Moss now occupies a cell in the county jail.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

The proceedings of the city council last evening were void of anything particularly interesting, only routine business being transacted. Delivery by carrier on the same terms as in Salt Lake.

A plot and dedication of the opening of Grant avenue from Thirty-first to Thirty-third street, was presented, and accepted.

The recorder was directed to advertise for bids to furnish rock to the city for macadamizing the road.

WEBER COUNTY AFFAIRS.

The board of county commissioners at its regular meeting transacted a small amount of business yesterday. Chairman Stanford presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

"Be it resolved by the board of county commissioners of Weber county that all claims for salaries of officers and clerks and all employees rendering service to Weber county be approved and allowed for payment on the last Monday in each month that all other claims for salaries and materials of all kinds, for contract work and for all work performed on the roads under the direction of the road supervisors be paid on the first Monday in each month, this resolution to become effective on June 1, 1905. All orders and resolutions of this board in conflict with the foregoing are hereby rescinded and set aside."

County Assessor Edwin Fox appeared before the board and reported that he had completed the assessment of property of all classes in the county, and that the total valuation was \$12,344,827, an increase of \$197,255 over the valuation for 1904.

Secy. C. R. Hollingsworth of the board of trustees of the State Industrial school submitted a communication calling the board's attention to the statutes relating to the amount due the school from Weber county for the care of inmates of the school sent up from this county. The communication was laid upon the table.

On motion of Commissioner Wilson the clerk was instructed to communicate with local firms asking for bids on at least 10 ton road rollers, to be used on the roads of the county.

G. A. R. ENCAMPMENT.

All the committees for the above encampment met at the city hall Sunday last, to report progress and make final arrangements for the G. A. R. encampment to be held here Monday next. From the reports, and looking up of the business, as near as it can be done, at this writing, everything is in an encouraging condition, and there is no doubt that there will be several thousand visitors, and that it will be a banner day for Ogden.

Supt. Allison, of the city schools, will have asked to be permitted to hold his sides from the school building, to see that the children are properly placed and lend success to the occasion. There will be special and regular police detailed to

see that no harm will come to the dear ones of any family, the teams will be kept off that side of the street, and everything done for their safety and pleasure. Several thousand flags are being prepared as souvenirs of the day, to become the property of the children after the event is over. During this week they will be placed in the hands of the teachers of each building for distribution. It is hoped to make this one of the most impressive affairs of the day.

The school for the Deaf and Blind, Sacred Heart academy, Weber State academy and Industrial school, have been invited to take part.

The governor, senators, members of Congress and other state officials are expected to be present. The attendance of the G. A. R. and auxiliary is sure to be the largest ever assembled in the history of the state.

The local command of the state Guard and Spanish war veterans, are to be out in force and lend their aid in making the affair a striking success from a military point of view.

It is hoped that the local pride of the city and the patriotism of all will be displayed in the flinging to the breeze of old glory from every vantage point.

The national committee and staff are expected to arrive Sunday. They will take a run down to Salt Lake City, returning next morning with the contingent from the south.

The collecting committee will generally visit the business community this week and a generous response will no doubt be had in this very large affair which will do so much for Ogden.

Comrade H. C. Wardlaw will act as instilling officer in the evening, and the musical numbers, with the speeches and other program, will do much for the edification of all. And the G. A. R. dance at the pavilion will be a feature to those interested in that pleasant pastime.

IMPRESSIVE OBSEQUIES.

Mrs. Constance Thatcher Nibley Laid to Rest—Beautiful Life Eulogized.

Logan, Cache Co., May 7.—Funeral services over the remains of Constance Thatcher Nibley were held in the Logan tabernacle at 4 p. m. today. A large number in attendance, more than 1,000, and large number of beautiful floral tributes manifested in a small way the great esteem felt for the young lady by the people of Logan. The services were conducted by the Bishop of the First ward. The choir sang the opening hymn and touching solos were given by Frank Smith and M. J. Ballard.

A heartfelt tribute of the noble work and worth of the deceased were paid by Mattie B. Hansen, president of the Primary organizations of the stake, who had known Mrs. Nibley since she was a child. Her remains were identified before her marriage three years ago, also by Hon. Joseph Howell, Miss Anna Smith, Pres. Joseph Morrell and Hon. C. W. Nibley. The speaker said that the blood of martyrdom was much in memory of the departed, and feelingly referred to her purity, gentleness and kindness of heart, and the nobleness of her character and sweet disposition. Her influence as a mother, being felt by all with whom she came in contact. One of the most beautiful characteristics of the departed was her sympathy for the sick and those in distress. In her childhood days she would often visit the sick in their homes and often take them something to cheer them up and to bring comfort and joy.

The services throughout were the most impressive ever held in this city, some time due to the high place which the young lady occupied in the hearts of the people, and the great sympathy felt for the mother and husband and family who were left behind.

The funeral cortege to the cemetery was the largest seen for a long time. It was regrettable that all of the family could not be present, but the funeral, the sisters, Mrs. Luna Farrell and Miss Phyllis were in New York, the former being unable to make the journey and the latter arriving too late to attend the funeral.
