It was seen that it was a dangerous power to give to one Department to be used give to one Department to be used against another, yet it was anticipated that such an emergency might arise in which nothing but such a power could be effective in preserving the Republic. Happily, for the eighty years of our po-litical existence which have passed, no such emergency has hitherto arisen, although, during that time we have witnessed the fiercest contests of party again and again; but now the Executive and Legislative Departments have risen in open and bitter antagonism. A favorite legislative policy has more than once been defeated by the obstinate and determined resistance of the President, and upon him the gravest and most important issues we ever had, or are ever likely to have now rest. EDITORIAL SUMMARY.

At a meeting of workingmen held recently at the Freemason's Tavern, Great Queen street, London, on the subject of the Irish Church; the chairman -Mr. George Potter, made some rearks from which we condense the fol lowing from Reynolds Newspaper.

The population of Ireland in 1861 was 5,688,067, of whom only 693,857, or about

one of every nine persons, belonged to the Established Church. For their spiritual benefit the State employs two. Archbishops, ten Bishops and about 1,500 clergymen. The yearly income of these 1,500 journeyman parsons or curates is said to be about £500,000, while that of their ten or twelve employersthe Archbishops and Bishops amounts to several hundred thousand pounds sterling. There are 199 parishes in Ireland without any church population, and eighteen benefices without a single resident member of the Established Church, the clergy of which receive incomes varying from £100 to £500. There are 229 benefices whose united income amounts to £83,071; there are also 615 others whose income in the aggregate amounts to £257,000. In these benefices it is said that each member's yearly bill for gospel alone, amounts to £31, or over \$150. There are 575 parishes which do not number above twenty members of the Episcopal Church each. There are also 443 benefices, the total Church population of which numbers only 20,529; yet the yearly cost of guiding them to Heaven is nearly £100,000. The personal property of twenty bishops of the Irish Church, who have died within the past fifty years has been sworn at £861,868, being an average of £43,093, or about \$210,000 each. One of the great lights of the Church, who died in 1865-Lord John Beresford, Archbishop of Armagh had received from Church revenues alone the moderate sum of £887,000, or over \$4,000,000.
