EASTERN DISPARATES.

WASHINGTON, 23.—There are now in its
branches, principally in the South, an
aggregate of deposits amounting to over
four millions of dollars. The reports
of the unsoundness of the institution
are groundless.

NEW YORK, 23.—In the court of
Owen and Terrell, to-day, the com-
plaint for \$100,000 offered an affidavit of
their client, asking an early trial, on
the ground that new evidence had been
discovered of his innocence, and alleg-
ing his failing health.

Mayor Hall appeared in court to-day
and in response to the call of the dis-
trict attorney, gave bail on a new in-
dictment, which he did.

Tweed surrendered to the sheriff at
10:30 a.m., and subsequently went to
the district attorney's office and gave
bail in five thousand on each indict-
ment. His sureties are Edward Kear-
ney and A. B. Sands.

When Mayor Hall appeared in court
he said the actions for his trial, were
upon the district attorney re-
quested him to plead to the indictment.
The Mayor then plead "not guilty."
The district attorney's associate asked
for delay, but at the request of the
major the case was proceeded with.

Petkan delivered himself of the open
speech for the prosecution, after
which there was an adjournment till
to-morrow.

Havas journals indicate an excited
state of affairs at Porto Rico, and a
disturbance between the Liberals and
Conservatives is thought probable.

George Parsons has been held to bail
in \$5,000 for shipping unlabeled fire-
works on the steamer *Charlestown*.

There is no apparent improvement
in Mrs. Greeley's health.

Gov. Hoffman has named John R.
Bandy, one of the associate judges for
the general term of this department in
place of ex-Judge Barnes.

On the presentation of checks for
gold at some of the banks in Wall Street,
the discovery was made that the
banks had no coin to meet the de-
mand. There is much apprehension
in regard to the savings banks through-
out the country on account of the trou-
ble which is reported from different
sections. The latest rumors are
relative to the Freedmen's Savings Bank,
whose branches extend throughout the
Southern States, and the People's
Savings Bank of Syracuse.

Syracuse, 23.—S. N. Goodale, who
a few days ago brought a libel suit
against the *Evening Journal*, in this city, for pub-
lishing a dispatch from Boston implicating
him in the recent murder of
Chas. Lane, at Dorchester, Mass., has
brought a similar suit against the
American Standard Savings Bank, for
the same amount of money, here.

New York, 23.—Tom Fields, not
appearing in court to-day, when his
case was called, the Judge ordered the
suspension of his bail.

Judge Bradley denied the motion of
Tweed's counsel to quash the indict-
ment against Tweed in the court of
Owen and Terrell, holding that the
indictment differed from the one in
the court of general session, and that
the trial thereof must be proceeded
with.

Twelve cars were withdrawn from
the Sixth Avenue to-day, in con-
sequence of the cattle disease. Other
lines are not materially affected,
in many stables the disease is not
known, and it is thought that the na-
ture of the epidemic has been exaggerated
as many cases have been rapidly
curtailed.

BOSTON.—The horse epidemic is seri-
ously hurting business, travel, &c.

ROCHESTER.—The horse disease con-
tinues its ravages, and there is no
scope of horses to supply the market
neighborhood unaffected, although very few
fatal cases are reported. All business
is more or less affected, and the mer-
chants are hind-sen and boys to
transhipping their goods. The street cars
are running, and the livery stables
are closed. The disease prevails in the
surrounding country as extensively as
in the city. It is stated that only in
one case where bleeding has been reported
to have the horses died.

leave of absence to go home to vote.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The secretary
of the Treasury has issued the fol-
lowing instructions to the collectors of Ro-
chester, Washington, Cape Vincent and
Port Huron:

You are directed, so long as the ex-
isting horse disease prevails in Canada,
to allow no horses to be brought into
your port or district from that country,
unless perfectly satisfied they are free
from contagious disease.

The following dispatch was received
from Hon. Hamilton Fish:—The three
experts to whom the American mem-
bers referred, have made
each for himself a very elaborate re-
port on the question, supporting their
opinions by reasons stated with great
accuracy and exactness. The
Expert has also with the highest
official duty, given his personal
attention to the subject, and after the
most careful study and deliberation has
arrived at a conclusion satisfactory to
his own sense of justice. He notes of
the experts, with their reasons, his rea-
soning, and the reasons of the others. The
decision of Imperial arbitration, which has been
communicated, has the form not so
much of a decree in council as of a cab-
inet order. It does not enter into an
elaborate exposition of the decision, but
without diverging in the least from the
point presented for arbitration, declares
that the claim of the United States is
manifestly just, and that the interpretation
of the treaty of June 15, 1846,
I shall forward an official copy of the
decree by special messenger.
