LOCAL BRIEFS.

Farmers out in the county say that the advent of warm weather will start vegetation on the jump.

The Ladies Aid of the Central Christian church are holding an all day work meeting in the church today.

The State University faculty will give its annual reception to students tomorrow evening, in the Museum building.

A special meeting of the acting Teachers of Sugar House ward will be held in the meetinghouse tonight at 8 o'clock.

Utah Quartet will give a concert in the evening at the home of Mrs. Thomas, at 10th and Main.

Dr. La Motte, U. S. N. retired, gave an interesting talk yesterday, before the West Side High school, on the life of a naval officer. He was at 11th and Main.

A new daughter arrived at the home of County Commissioner James C. Mackay yesterday. This is the twelfth child and only the second daughter in the family.

About 100 people so far have declared their intention of joining the pilgrimage to the Commercial club to participate in the pilgrimage to Los Angeles on the evening of the 9th inst.

The third annual conference of the Seventh Missionary district of the Episcopal church, comprising the Pacific slope, is being held today, in St. Mark's cathedral, Bishop J. B. Funtsten of Boise presiding.

Miss Maud Eldredge, floor manager for the Independent Telephone company, was taken with appendicitis Tuesday afternoon and removed to the Holy Cross hospital. She is now convalescent from a successful operation.

Ninety days in the county jail is the sentence imposed upon Charles Larson by Justice of the Peace William of Bligh, for the crime of petit larceny. He was charged with stealing 50 cents from a drunken man.

The Anderson Real Estate & Investment company of this city has now in course of construction, 15 residences in various sections of the city, representing an investment of \$65,000. The company has great faith in the future of the town.

Thomas Pink was taken to the reform school at Ogden yesterday by sheriff Henry. The boy had the habit of taking horses and bunnies and driving them all over town and leaving them tied up in a different locality from which they were taken. He was committed on the charge of incorrigibility.

The troops from Fort Douglas and the National Guard will participate as usual, and the Philippine veterans are to take action next Sunday afternoon, as to their share in the celebration. Col. On the morning of the 29th inst., memorial services will be held in the First Methodist church, with Rev. Benjamin Young to preach the sermon. An orator for each cemetery will be chosen shortly.

Funeral services over the remains of Mrs. Sarah M. Hammond, wife of D. R. Hammond, were held yesterday at the First ward meetinghouse. The building, which was beautifully prepared for the occasion, was crowded to its capacity with relatives and friends of the estimable lady who had been so suddenly and unexpectedly called to the great beyond. A male quartet rendered appropriate selections, and the speakers were Elders R. S. Hinckley, Edward Haby, Reuben Hansen, Arnold Schultze, Joseph E. Taylor, Nick Rasmussen and Bishop Joseph Warburton, all of whom testified feelingly of the noble life of the deceased, and spoke words of comfort to the bereaved ones. After the services the family accompanied the remains to Millville, the birthplace and early home of Mrs. Hammond, where interment will take place today.

YOUTHFUL HOLDUPS.

Two Boys Relieve B. S. Schmidt of Cash and Jewelry.

There are two more youthful holdups, candidates for the state's prison for a long term, in Salt Lake.

About 2 o'clock this morning they held up and robbed B. S. Schmidt, who runs a billiard hall at 128 west Second South, of a diamond stud, a pin, a gold watch and chain and about \$100 in cash. The holdup occurred at 23 west Third South, as Mr. Schmidt was about to enter the place. He encountered the holdups suddenly, and as one held a gun on him and ordered him to throw up his hands, the other went through Schmidt's pockets and took the valuables.

Schmidt said that neither of the robbers wore a mask, and that they did not look to be more than 16 years of age.

BANK'S CREDITORS MAY INCORPORATE

Compromise Proceedings Are Now Under Way Looking to This End.

SCHETTLER TO GIVE UP HOME.

Examination Before Commissioner Baldwin Postponed During Arrangement of Terms for Settlement.

It is probable that the last public hearing has occurred in the examination of the case of B. H. Schettler, and that unless some hitch occurs in the compromise proceedings now under way the case will reach a speedy termination, except in regard to the criminal actions awaiting trial. The final outcome will be a disposition of the bank's assets plus the Brigham street property by a corporation to be formed of the creditors. While the compromise proceedings are being arranged the hearing of the case in the office of Commissioner Baldwin's court will be postponed from time to time, and finally abandoned in case a decision is arrived at.

This morning in the office of Stewart & Stewart, a committee of depositors consisting of Mrs. Dale, Peter Hansen, John Beck, Andrew Granter, David Hirsche, Charles Zell, and several other heavy creditors met and discussed the details of compromise proceedings offered by the firm of Rawlins & Hay, on behalf of the Schettlers.

The compromise offer is one that many creditors have been trying to secure for a long time, and while provisions have been made several times, this is the first one that has met favor from both sides. Speaking of it to the "News" today, Mr. Hirsche, who has tried for many weeks to bring such a move about, said: "I feel elated over the prospect, and I think that every depositor has cause to feel encouraged. By the terms of this agreement we will receive more money than we possibly could in following up the bankruptcy proceedings. I expect we may recover at least fifty cents on the dollar, and possibly more, even up to seventy-five cents."

The terms of the compromise are: The Schettlers are to turn over all assets of the bank, and the East Temple street home, to the creditors. Mary Morgan Schettler to pay all legal expenses connected with turning over the home. In return the creditors are to allow Mrs. Schettler \$5,000 of the sale of her home for the purchase of a new residence in some part of Salt Lake. The creditors are to drop the investigation now under way, and to abandon the civil suits for recovery of the Schettler home.

When asked as to how the creditors would manage their property, one of the heavy depositors said today: "Everything depends on the action of the creditors. If some of them will not stand by the compact we can do nothing—but it seems to me that this is by far the wisest course for us to take. Most of the really valuable assets of the Schettlers' bank are in real estate, and the market for this class of securities is advancing. If we should form a corporation to handle them, they would not believe we could dispose of them at good figures in time, and as cash was realized on them, declare dividends to the shareholders. This would ultimately result in at least 50 per cent on our deposits."

The hearing in the case is now set for tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, but it is believed that a continuance will be over two years, under the firm name of Geo. Romney Lumber Co.
