SUFFRAGISTS THANK GOV. J. C. CUTLER

For Granting Request to Appoint Women to Serve With Men On Divorce Question.

MRS. MEAD ON WORLD CRISIS.

Miss Susan B. Authony's Eighty-Sixth Birthday to be Properly Celebrated.

Baltimore, Md., Feb. 13.-Today's session of the Women's National Suffrage association was devoted to the reading of reports of state presidents and the transaction of miscellaneous business, including action on the report of the committee on resolutions. The report which was adopted was, in part:

"Resolved, That we rejoice in the decision of the men of Finland to extend full suffrage to women and in the unprecedented growth of public sentiment in many European countries in the direction of equal rights for women

and men. "That we acjoice in the success of the women of Oregon in obtaining the sig-natures of one-eight of the legal voters to a petition for the admission of women suffrage under the initiative and referendum law of that state."

The resolutions urge the introduction into the public schools of the system

of self-government known as the "School city;" also to secure juvenile courts for the reformation of youthful offenders, express grateful appreciation of the action of the American Federation of Labor in passing every year a resolution indorsing full suffrage for

women, and continue:
"Whereas, for the first time in history women have been invited to form

tory women have been invited to form part of an official commission to investigate matters of vital importance to women and children.

"Resolved. That we express our hearty thanks to the governors of Wyoming. Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Louisiana, Michigan, Florida, Washington and Alaska, for granting the request of the California Woman Suffrage association, to appoint women to serve with eminent men on a committee to ineminent men on a committee to investigate the laws of marriage and

"Whereas, the second Hague conference wilt soon convene, therefore "Resolved. That all suffragists be urged to enlist the co-operation of influential persons in securing a strong and intelligent public sentiment re-garding the tremendous possibilities of the coming conference,'

At the night session Mrs. Lucia Ames Mead of Boston spoke on "The World's Present Crisis," saying, in part: "The United States, protected by two oceans, with not a nation on the hem-isphere that dares to attack her, with not a nation in the world that is her enemy, a rich nation, with endless re-sources, this most fortunate nation is the one of all others to lead the world out of the increasingly intolerable

bondage of armaments."

The singing of the "Star Spangled Banner," by the chorus and audience, all standing, brought the thirty-eighth annual convention of the association

annual convention of the association to an end.

Many of the delegates will go to Washington, where on Thursday the eighty-sixth birthday of Miss Susan B. Anthony will be celebrated.

At this celebration adresses will be made by Representative W. P. Hepburn of Iowa, Senator Fred T. Dubois of Idaho, Secy. of War William H. Taft, Representative Frank W. Mondell of Wyoming and W. A. Reeder of Kan-

Wyoming and W. A. Reeder of Kan-sas and others, and letters of con-gratulation will be read from Presi-dent Roosevelt, Senators Dolliver, War-ren. Beveridge, Fulton, Patterson, Platt, Depew, Allison and others.
