## DISTRICT COURT MATTERS

Probate and Other Business Heard by Judge Rolapp.

Arrested for Stealing a Gun — Registration Figures for the City and County — Forfeited — \$20.

Before Judge Rolapp in Second district court:

The case of N. Tanner, Jr., vs Boyle, was continued until Nov. 18, 1900.

Ten days additional time was granted in which to answer in the case of F. Ashills vs R. J. Hill.

The cases of Larson vs Lowe Co., and Christensen vs Ludwig were, by consent, stricken from the present calendar.

In the matter of the estate of Martha M. Wilson, the administratrix filed her final account and petition for distribution and discharge.

In the matter of the guardianship of Charles S. Warner et al., A. P. Biglow was appointed guardian under \$16,000 bond.

In the matter of the estate of Sophia Ross, deceased, Alexander D. Ross was appointed administrator.

In the matter of the estate of Alexander Ross, incompetent; appraisers were appointed.

## ARRESTED FOR STEALING A GUN.

As they were stepping off a Union Pacific train yesterday afternoon Charles O'Brien and Mac Ryan were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Bailey. The arrest was made at the request of Messrs. Higgins &amp; White of Aspen, Wyo., who sent a telegram informing the sheriff of the theft of a gun. At the sheriff's office the men were searched and the stolen gun found in their possession. A telegram was immediately sent to Higgins &amp; White and it is expected that an officer from Aspen will arrive tomorrow to take the prisoners back again.

## REGISTRATION FIGURES.

The returns of the first two days of registration have been received at the county clerk's office showing in the city 2,317 voters registered and three precincts yet to report. In the county 577 registered with sixteen districts to hear from, giving a total of 3,694 persons registered.

At the last congressional election there were 4,217 votes cast in the city, and 2,457 polled in the county, making a total of 6,674 polled.

## STATE INSANE ASYLUM.

Large Increase of Patients — Census and Finances—Probate Orders.

Provo, Utah Co., Oct. 12.—At the regular monthly meeting of the insane asylum commissioners held yesterday, the following business was transacted:

Appropriations to pay expenses were made in the following amounts:

Salaries ..... \$1,365.65

Current expenses ..... 1,618.61

Contingent account ..... 287.50

Total ..... \$3,270.16

The treasurer reported a balance on hand September 1st of \$1,365.65. Received from pay patients ..... 416.75

Received from State warrants ..... 2,705.00

Total ..... \$3,484.40

Disbursed ..... 2,866.55

Balance on hand Oct. 1st ..... \$ 617.67

A requisition was ordered to be made on the State auditor for a warrant for \$2,866.55, to pay expenses for September.

An estimate of supplies for the institution needed for six months ending April 30, 1901, was submitted by Medical Superintendent Hardy and approved. An advertisement was ordered to be made for the supplies.

## SHEEP FEEDING IN NEBRASKA.

Just issued Bulletin No. 66, which sets forth the results of experiments in feeding sheep on different rations, with and without shelter. Eight lots of lambs were fed. Alfalfa and prairie hay were used as roughage, four lots being fed on each. Seven lots had a protected yard and a sheet for shelter. Lot eight had only an open yard with no sheet for shelter.

The lambs gained an average of fifty pounds when the experiment commenced on November 26, 1899, and sold in Omaha one hundred days later, weighing an average of seventy-five pounds.

Four different grain rations were fed to the four lots on prairie hay and three grain rations to the four lots on alfalfa hay.

Lot 1, on alfalfa hay and corn, gained thirty-three pounds in one hundred days and paid a profit of \$2.05 per lamb.

Lot 2, on alfalfa hay and a grain ration of three-fourths corn and one-fourth oats, gained thirty-two pounds in one hundred days, and gave a profit of \$1.98 per lamb.

Lot 3, on alfalfa hay and a grain ration of three-fourths corn and one-fourth bran, made a gain of thirty-four pounds in one hundred days and gave a profit of \$1.90 per lamb.

Lot 4 was fed on prairie hay and no shelter. It received alfalfa hay and a grain ration of three-fourths corn and one-fourth bran, making a gain of thirty-four pounds in one hundred days and gave a profit of \$1.83 per lamb.

Lot 5 was fed on prairie hay and a grain ration of corn with sixteen per cent linseed meal, making a gain of twenty-four pounds per head, in one hundred days and gave a profit of \$1.94 per lamb.

Lot 6 was fed on prairie hay and a grain ration of three-fourths corn and one-fourth oats, making a gain of nineteen pounds in one hundred days and gave a profit of \$1.80 per lamb.

Lot 7 was fed prairie hay and a grain ration of three-fourths corn and one-fourth oats, making a gain of nineteen pounds per head in one hundred days and gave a profit of \$1.72 per head.

Lot 8 was fed on prairie hay and a grain ration of corn with sixteen per cent linseed meal, making a gain of twenty-four pounds per head, in one hundred days and gave a profit of \$1.69 per lamb.

The alfalfa fed lambs consumed 134 pounds of hay and one pound of grain each per day against 59 pounds of hay and .59 pounds of grain consumed by the prairie fed lambs.
