LOCAL BRIEFS.

Albert Bishop of Bapah, Utah, was successfully operated upon yesterday afternoon, at the Keogh-Wright hospital for an ununited fracture of the knee.

J. C. McLain and wife entertained this noon, the members of McLain's Sunday school class of the First Methodist church, at their home, 1238 east First Street.

Manager A. H. Hay of the Western Union in this city leaves tonight on a 10 days' visit in the east, and in his absence A. W. Long will be in charge of the Salt Lake office.

The home and education section of the Ladies' Literary club is holding a rummage sale today, at 20 south Main street, in aid of the model corridor to be prepared in the Uintah school.

While riding along a dark sidewalk last night, between Third and Fourth East streets, two wheelmen collided, one of them, a young man named Roberts, sustaining a painful scalp wound. Both wheels were demolished.

Sunday afternoon at the Commercial club committees representing Salt Lake, Ogden and Provo lodges of the Woodmen of the World will meet to confer with committees of the Real Estate association and Commercial club in regard to securing the western headquarters of the Woodmen of the World.

Sheriff Emery received notice of Foster's arrest last night. Revision papers were issued today, and Deputy Sheriff Steele will leave tonight to bring the prisoner back to this city.

Fifty boys celebrated St. Patrick's day last evening, in the Phillips Congregational church. Messrs. Davis, Turner and Crocker, with mandolin and guitar, and Miss Irma Dunham, vocalists, helped materially in entertaining the boys, and seven new names were added to the roster of the Boys' club of the church. The evening closed with refreshments.

Government Engineers H. N. Savage and P. Davis of the reclamation bureau at Washington, were here in the city on the 29th inst., to consult with Prof. Swendson with reference to the Weber river and Bear Lake irrigation projects. As all of the preliminary work has been completed, upon the report to the secretary of the interior of these two consulting engineers, active construction can begin.

The annual St. Patrick's day entertainment in the Salt Lake Theater in aid of St. Ann's Catholic orphanage, will be given this evening, under the direction of Miss Nora Gleeson, when children will appear in songs, dances and various acts. In addition, Miss Gleeson is to have two soloists, and two adult singers to give a number of Moore's Irish melodies, also the All Hallows college orchestra and band will play several Irish selections.

All except two, however, returned to the post within the prescribed hour. Bowes and Beer were called to attend him, and they believe that he will pull through all right, although he was unconscious for several hours. Reports from the state that he passed a bad night, but seems somewhat better today.

Mary Baer Gummell, the young woman who alleged that she had been turned away from the home of her husband's parents and who sought aid from the county, has been sent back to the Holy Cross hospital by Dr. Whitney, county physician. She left the hospital, where she was receiving treatment, because the bills had not been paid by her father-in-law, which she says he had agreed to do. Her mother denies that he agreed to settle the amount due, but says he had signed a willingness to help his son to pay the obligation. Mr. Gummell also says that the girl was not turned out by his wife, but that she left the house of her own choice, and over the protest of her mother-in-law.

The odors that have been giving trouble along Main street in particularly and which were thought to have

come from the sewers, prove to have come from the gas pipes. Investigation by the management of the gas department and company discovered that the purifying plant was not equal to the demands made upon it, and crude gas was being sent out into the pipes. Orders were wired immediately to eastern manufacturers for additional purifying pans and on the reception and installation of these, the trouble will disappear. For the present, the company will be forced to manufacture only as much gas as the pipes now in operation can take care of.
