Wash ngton tonight declared that the situaion in the African republic was serious and that the United States was n duty bound to render practical asdstance to Liberia, which was estabished in 1819 by the United States govrnment and philanthropic individuals,

Mr. Washington said: "The present condition of Liberia is erious. There are about 40,000 civilized negroes who have emigrated from the United States or are descendants of people who emigrated years ago. Back of these in the hinterland are about a million and a half of uncivilized






