

MISS ILLINGTON SEEKING DIVORCE

She Craves Home Life With Children and Even Wants to Darn Stockings.

SHE MAY ALSO MARRY AGAIN.

Will Give Up Daniel Frohman—He Is Much Older—Stage Life Is Abnormal.

San Francisco, Feb. 14.—Because she craves home life with the children and even the darning of socks that go with it, is the chief reason why Margaret Illington is seeking a legal separation from her husband, Daniel Frohman, according to an interview which she gave out at the Clara Barton hospital in this city, where she is taking the rest cure. The actress does not deny that she will marry Edward J. Bowen, when she has secured a divorce from Frohman.

Miss Illington made the following statement of her reasons for seeking a separation from her husband:

"I am to get a divorce from Mr. Frohman and want to tell you that I am to marry Mr. Bowen when I am free, but I can't say that now, you know. But I did not leave Mr. Frohman to marry Mr. Bowen or you or any one—I left him because I could not be happy on the stage. The life of an actress is abnormal. I crave domesticity, home life, children; I want to darn socks. From the first I told Mr. Frohman that I wanted a home, domestic life. But he wanted to make a great star out of me. How I wanted to stay at home and darn his socks! Mr. Frohman is 30 years older than I am. I lived in New York with his three sisters, who are maiden ladies from 25 to 35 years older than I. How could I envy them as I would go to the theater every night and leave them to do the house work and darn socks. Always I wanted domestic life and children. I wanted to lead the life of a normal woman. The stage life might be well for the woman born to it, but you know, it is abnormal. Think of it, I played 'The Thief' for 14 months. My life was in railroad, trunk, cab and ballet. When I found that Mr. Frohman intended to keep me on the stage always my love died. I saw then no chance of a domestic life I craved, so we parted."

"Yes, Mr. Frohman knows Mr. Bowen and admires him highly," said Miss Illington, concluding the interview.

FROHMAN'S STATEMENT.

New York, Feb. 14.—Daniel Frohman, the theatrical manager, announced today that he and Mrs. Frohman, who was Miss Margaret Illington, the actress, had decided upon a separation, with a view to an ultimate divorce.

She desires to take up her residence permanently in California, where she has always been, and will live with her parents. There is no scandal involved in this arrangement, no man or woman is the cause of it, in fact the arrangement is far more unobscured than hostile on either part. "Mrs. Frohman, though in good physical health, is at present resting at a health resort in California, where, after a few weeks' quiet, she will be entirely recovered. She came to New York from California a few weeks ago, apparently entirely recovered from her breakdown in the 'Thief'; but the eastern climate did not agree with her. She finds solace and health in the air of the Pacific slope, and there she has decided to live for the future. We have been married for nearly six years."

Mr. Frohman is the manager and proprietor of the Lyceum theater and is a brother of Charles Frohman, the most prominent theatrical producer in the United States.

Following her graduation from a dramatic school in Chicago nine years ago, Miss Illington has achieved various successes on the stage under the management of her husband. Some weeks ago she broke down under the strain of the work, and it was stated at the time that she might retire permanently from the stage.

HORRIBLE DOMESTIC CONDITION ENDS IN TRAGEDY

St. Joseph, Mo., Feb. 14.—In the probably fatal shooting here today of William Smith, a carpenter, there came to light one of the strangest domestic tragedies that has ever lived under a girl 22 years old, who shot Smith, avers to the police that she married him, knowing that her mother was already his legal wife. The three have lived for years together, the man as the husband of both.

The shooting this afternoon occurred over the sending of a contract valentine. The girl, who styles herself Mrs. Cora Smith, while her mother is known by the name of Mrs. William Smith, sent the carpenter a come valentine, which grew angry when he received it and, after packing up his clothes, started to leave the house. The girl's mother says she married Smith in 1902. Her daughter was by a former husband, she says, she found that her husband had improper relations with her daughter. She made him marry the girl, she says, without first securing a divorce. The girl and husband both bear the same name.

Mrs. Cora Smith, who shot her husband, was placed under arrest by the police. She will be held pending Smith's condition.

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AMERICA'S OUT TOWARD LIBERIA

Booker T. Washington Says United States Should Render African Republic Assistance.

CONDITION IS VERY SERIOUS.

But Not Hopeless—Emigrants from This Country Have Shown Wonderful Political Capacity.

New York, Feb. 14.—Endorsing the view of former Secy. Root that Liberia is an American colony, Booker T. Washington tonight declared that the situation in the African republic was serious and that the United States was in duty bound to render practical assistance to Liberia, which was established in 1819 by United States government and philanthropic individuals. Mr. Washington said:

"The present condition of Liberia is serious. There are about 40,000 civilized negroes who have emigrated from the United States or are descendants of people who emigrated years ago. Back of these in the hinterland are about a million and a half of uncivilized people."

"The present condition of Liberia, however, need not surprise any one. In fact, the surprise is that Liberia has maintained itself as an independent nation for so long, period with almost no help from outside sources except that which has been furnished by philanthropic individuals. Every European country which has planted a colony in Africa has spent millions of dollars in assisting their colonies. These European governments have also sent their best officials to supervise and guide the people until they have gotten started. In the case of Liberia, a small body of people just out of slavery in this country, with no experience in government or the conduct of educational institutions or without responsibility for their own conduct, were sent to a foreign country and the responsibility placed upon them within a few years of building and maintaining a government. I do not believe the condition of Liberia is hopeless, but I do believe this government owes, as Secy. Root says, a duty to the country. We have spent large sums of money and given some of our best officials to reorganize and build governments in the Philippines, Hawaii, Cuba, Porto Rico and San Domingo and we certainly owe an equal duty to Liberia."

"I believe and hope the United States will carry out the recommendations made to Congress by former Secy. Root and by President Roosevelt in the direction of lending practical assistance through the sending of three commissioners to Liberia as early as possible."

FROZEN TO DEATH.

Burns, Or., Feb. 14.—Henry Miller, 22 years old, grandson of Henry Miller, millionaire cattle and landowner, was found Feb. 11 frozen to death on Alvord desert, in the south end of this county. Miller, whose home is in San Francisco, has been visiting at the Alvord ranch for the last three months, and it is supposed, was riding horseback on Sunday, and became lost and overtaken by a snowstorm and perished.

ADMIRAL BERESFORD TO RELINQUISH COMMAND

London, Feb. 14.—It was announced by the admiralty today that Admiral Lord Charles Beresford commander-in-chief of the channel fleet will vacate his command on March 24. The fleet then will disappear as the chief fighting unit of the first line of Great Britain's naval force. Henceforth the more important vessels of the channel fleet, under command of Admiral Sir Archibald Heskely Hulse, now second in command in the channel fleet, will from the second division of the main fleet under second command of Vice-Admiral William H. May, second lord of the admiralty.

CARS LEFT RAIL.

One Passenger Killed and Eight Others Injured on Missouri Pacific.

Omaha, Neb., Feb. 15.—One passenger was killed and eight others injured, some of them seriously, when three coaches of the Missouri Pacific, Kansas City passenger train No. 104, left the rails in Omaha, a short distance south of here today.

A LOVER'S SUICIDE.

Newark, N. J., Feb. 15.—Because Mrs. Mary Schuster with whom he formerly boarded, would not marry him, Louis Heyman shot and killed himself in his home this city last night. He had only recently been released from prison for flourishing a pistol and carrying a dangerous weapon on previous occasions. Arriving at the house last night he produced a revolver and Mrs. Schuster fled. Returning later she found him lying dead on the floor.

DRESS ATTIRE FOR ROOSEVELT'S ESCORT

New York, Feb. 15.—Those of the Republican county committee who will make up the delegation to act as an escort to President Roosevelt on inauguration day are instructed to attire themselves as follows: Dark, citizen attire, high silk hats restricted to the vintage of 1899 and gloves, Russian golf and law tennis shoes "not in it." Neither are rubber boots or slippers. The personnel of the delegation will be made up at a meeting Thursday. Directions as to attire were sent out yesterday.

WHAT TITLE SHOULD A MARRIED MAN HAVE?

Chicago, Feb. 15.—What sort of a title should a married man bear? A state law may decide this question if the proposition put up to State senator Samuel A. Erickson, goes through. The senator has been approached by a number of unmarried women, who say that married men are constantly imposing upon them because it is impossible from a plain introduction of "Mister" to tell whether they are married or not. Senator Erickson is considering the matter.

"The married men ought to be designated," said he. "An unmarried woman is 'Miss' a married woman 'Mrs.' That is a simple and easily understood title. It is calculated to promote harmony between the sexes. Now, if the thing works one way, why won't it work the other? Let us differentiate between the benighted and the enlightened."

U. S. NAVY LEAGUE.

Admiral Evans Will Devote His Time To Booming It.

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Admiral Robley D. Evans, who is here to deliver a lecture, declares that from now on he will work for the establishment of a navy league in the United States, the object of which will be to give the navy such a powerful citizen support that it can obtain from Congress what it really needs.

"Germany has a navy league with 1,000,000 members," he said, "and it is strong enough to carry the day. England also has a similar league, and that is one reason why those countries have such powerful navies. We need one in the United States."

EX-BANKER TWINING SAID TO HAVE DISAPPEARED

Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. 15.—A special from Taos, N. M., says that news has been received there that Albert Twining, the former bank president of the Ashbury Park, N. J., bank sentenced to six years imprisonment for speculating with the bank's funds in mining properties in Taos county, has disappeared, and that his bondsmen are liable for \$50,000. The case has been in the courts for five years and last Tuesday the supreme court ordered Twining to commence serving his sentence.

PROTEST AGAINST PLACING DUTY ON COFFEE

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Protest against the placing of a duty on coffee has been sent to Washington by the coffee trade of Chicago, including roasters and retailers. Congressmen who represent this city have received petitions asking them to use their influence to prevent the subcommittee of the ways and means committee recommending a tariff.

Information that reaches Chicago is that a serious effort is being made to raise a revenue by taxing imported coffee from 2 to 5 cents a pound.

DARWIN AND TENNYSON.

The Poet in His Own Way Was an Adherent of Evolution.

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Dr. N. I. Rubinkin, in an address last night linked the names of Darwin and Tennyson in a discussion of the rise and progress of the theory of evolution which, he said, was interesting not only to the scientist and philosopher but also to the prophet and literature, to Carlyle, Emerson and Tennyson, who wrought it into their souls and their works. No poet, he said, was more sensitive to it or absorbed in it more fully than Tennyson, Darwin's fellow student and friend.

"Tennyson met the problems not as a scientist, with empirical demonstration, nor as the philosopher, with argument and dialectics nor as the theologian, with tradition, but as an artist—as a poet—with intuition, with spiritual clairvoyance, with addition, expressed in terms of art."

"The thought of evolution, human evolution, social evolution, through an infinite, illimitable past, or through countless aeons, and the million wonders of future ripening and unfolding, develop with ever clearer note in the Tennysonian poetry from his 'Maud,' his first 'Locksley Hall,' and 'The Princess' down to his 'Locksley Hall Sixty Years After,' and to his poems by an evolutionist 'The Dawn' and the 'Making of Man,' written as an octogenarian."

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
