If either vaccine or variolous is washed with the infusion of the sarracenia, they are deprived of their contagious properties. So mild is the medicine to the taste that it may be largely mixed with tea and coffee, and given to connoisseurs in these beverages to drink without their being aware of the admixture. The medicine has been sucresafully tried in the hospitals of Nova Scotia, and its use will be continued."

> If "Indian Cup" be not already here, it might probably be procured from some of the establishments in the East where the gathering and preparation of medical herbs is made a business of. Or failing in obtaining it in this manner some of our citizens who have friends in Nova Scotia might procure it or the seed through them. Resides being a specific for small pox it is also a valuable ingredient in the dyer's art, and its introduction into the Territory might be of service in this respect.

INDIANS AT LABAMIE - A dispatch reeived this morning per W. U. Telegraph line, dated Chevenne, 20th, says:

"Information received from Fort Laramie says there are now at that post one hundred and thirty-three lodges of Sioux, and more daily arriving. It is expected that one thousand lodges will be here by the last of this week. The Indians are impatient to hear from Red Cloud and think something is wrong. They are anxous to trade, and are very saucy and independent and will not allow any white man to cross the Platte to their camp.

In the first place there is a ride of over twenty miles by rail, which to hundreds and thousands of youngsters, and to many not very young, is a great novelty; then a walk of about a mile leads to a capital bathing place on the shore of Salt Lake, where bailing dresses for ladies and gentlemen can be hired for a tritle, with convenient places for undressing and dressing. There is also a fine pleasure vacht capable of accommodating tolerably large pleasure parties on the Lake, which can be hired at a low figure, with competent persons in charge during sailing excursions.

About half way between the end of the Brand J track and Lake Side, Mesars, Hector and Bruyo P Horton Haight have erected a commodious Brous S bowery for dancing, in the Grove, where also are swings and other conveniences for pleasure seekers. Parties of excursionists leairing the use of this grove and bowery can obtain it for a day for a merely nominal Carns D sum; and on reaching the end of the track good teams can be hired from the Mesars. Haight, with drivers, for the transportation meur L of all not inclined to walk to the Grove or to Lake Side. Thus it will be seen that a moderate sum per head will ensure a day s first-rate sport; and where families go the Dahl E average per head would be considerably Davis B less than otherwise. These wi'l certainly Dean J Doget R make Lake Side a popular and fashionable place of resort during the Summer months. This week it will have a large number of visitors: On Thursday there will be a grand Sunday school + xcursion; on Friday the Masons and Odd Fellows from this city will take a trip, and on Saturday, we believe, in addition to the usual weekly accommodation train, for the public generally, there will be an excursion party, composed of the pupils of the University.

He informs us that this is the time to catch large trout, as they can only be caught between the tenth o this month and the tenth of July. If they were not caught now, they would be safe; for they go into deep water at other times and the small fish would be the only ones Black J caught. Trout, he also says, spawn in the spring and the fall of the year. Respecting Bunn M fish being flabby this is caused by carelessness on the part of those who bring them to market. He gives us evidence, and is Fait A willing to give everybody else who will call upon him the same proof, that his fish are not solt and flabby.
