FULL PRESIDENTIAL VOTE.

Bryan's Popular Vote Was 6,357,853 United Christian Presidential Ticket Smallest on List.

New York, Dec. 20 .- The Times this morning publishes a table showing the popular vote for presidential electors in the recent election. Minnesota was the last State to declare its vote, this not having been done until yesterday (Wednesday).

In some States, as in Louisiana and South Carolina, there were the nominations of but two parties, Republican and Democratic; upon the ballots in other States there were three and four, and in some eight.

The total vote, including 6,211 scattering, was 13,967,239. Of this McKinley received 7,217,677, and Bryan 6,357,853. Woolley, Prohibitionist, received, so far as reported, 207,368; Barker, middle of the road Populist, 50,188; Debs, Social Democrat, 94,552, and Maloney, Social Labor, 33,459.

McKinley's plurality according to the figures of the Times, was \$59,824. Mc-Kinley's majority was 468,055.
