## OGDEN VALLEY LINE ABANDONED

Disposition to Hold Up the Rapid Transit for Right of Way Is Reason Assigned.

## UP AGAINST LABOR PROBLEM.

Ogden Sugar Factory Handicapped for Want of Laborers—After Japanese Help—Other Notes.

Ogden, Oct. 11.—David Eccles, president of the Utah and Idaho Railroad company, which started the construction of its line from the mouth of Ogden canyon eastward, stated last night that in all probability the company will abandon the road. Work of preparing the road bed from the mouth of the canyon has been going on for a couple of weeks with a gang of men, and everything indicated that the street car line through the canyon would be built by Mr. Eccles and his associates within the next twelve months. The cause for the abandonment of the road, Mr. Eccles says, is the apparent change of heart of those owning property through the canyon. He says that when his company advanced the proposition to build a street car line to Ogden valley it met with great favor and all interested parties were anxious to have the road built, and indications were that no difficulty would be met in securing the right of way, but now that the company has shown its good faith and commenced the work, the land owners show a different spirit, and appear to want to hold the company up for a high price for the right of way, and the management feels that it would rather abandon the proposition at the present time than to continue the building of the line further up the canyon and then perhaps have to abandon it after all. Mr. Eccles is of the opinion that the land owners and public in general will be as greatly benefited if not more than would the company from a street car line through Ogden canyon, and that the company should be encouraged in the project. If the right of way cannot be secured through the canyon without bringing condemnation proceedings, then it will never be secured by the Utah and Idaho Railroad company. This afternoon a committee of the company will meet County Commissioner W. G. Wilson, who is one of the largest property owners in Ogden canyon, and unless a decision over the proposed right of way can be secured without any difficulty, the work will not be continued further and there will be no street car line up Ogden canyon at the present time at least.

## AFTER JAPANESE LABORERS.

Sugar Company Short of Help and Must Get Asiatic Workmen.

Ogden, Oct. 11.—Never since the commencement of the Ogden sugar factory has the management had such difficulty in securing men to run the factory and to harvest the sugar beet crop, as this year. Up to the present time the factory has been run short handed on account of being unable to get men to do the work at unusually good wages, but the scarcity of men to do manual work is not alone limited to Ogden but throughout the entire northwest. David Eccles, who recently returned from a trip to Oregon and Washington, says that the same trouble is experienced there. There are plenty of men but the very high wages paid makes it possible for the men to work only about half the time, and get along very well, and they work for a short time, save up enough to live on for a little while, and many of them then lay around until their money is gone or else take a trip on the railroads to some other place and in that way get to see the country. So hard has Mr. Eccles found it to get white men that he has found it necessary to employ many Japs to work in the beet fields and at his lumber mills. Last evening Judge Rolapp left for the northwest to find Japs to ship to Ogden to harvest the beet crop here and to look after other business for the Amalgamated Sugar company.

## STREET RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

Boyd Shupe Injured and Two Cars Damaged in Collision.

Ogden, Oct. 11.—At street car collision occurred yesterday afternoon on the Ogden canyon line, resulting in injuries to Boyd Shupe and considerable damage to two cars. The accident took place near Apricot siding when canyon car No. 22 and car 13, which is a construction car, pulling a flatcar, collided. Motorman Jack Croyley, seeing that a collision could not be avoided turned on the brakes and jumped, thus escaping injury, while Boyd Shupe stood at his post and was severely shaken up and had several bones in his hand broken. The cars were badly shook up and the vestibule was broken off car 13.

## SKEEN DECLINES NOMINATION.

J. D. Skeen, who was nominated for the office of county attorney on the Union Labor ticket, announced last evening that he will not be a candidate for any office at the present time. He states that some weeks ago committees of the labor union called on him and asked permission to run him on their ticket for attorney. He gave his consent not knowing at that time of what he now thinks is misappropriation of county funds by certain county officials, but since discovering this matter and having decided to prosecute the alleged violators of the law, he does not desire to be hampered with any political office and will therefore refuse to be a candidate, but will devote his attention to preparing and prosecuting the cases against some of the county officials.

## MAIL CARRIER WANTED.

Postmaster Glasmann has received word from the postal department at Washington that unless a carrier can be found for R. F. D. No. 2, which includes North Ogden, Farr West, Pleasant View and Harrisville, that the department will discontinue the route, which it does will be a great disadvantage to the residents of that district. The route is a little less than 25 miles and the carrier therefore gets only \$448 per year, while all the other R. F. D. carriers in the county get \$720 per annum, their routes being over 35 miles. Thomas C. Iverson, who formerly carried the route resigned in August, and C. C. Smith qualified for the position, but when he learned that the salary had been cut down he refused to perform the work, and since then the route has been without a carrier. Mr. Glasmann has been notified that any competent person who desires the route may have it and pass the civil service examination Nov. 10, when one will be held in Ogden.
