LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

From the East.—Messrs. Don Carlos and Fernand Young, sons of the late President Brigham Young, arrived from the East last night. They have been pursuing their studies at the Polytechnic Institute, Troy, New York, and have come home to spend the summer's vacation. They purpose returning east the early part of September. Both are in good health.

Painful Accident.—On Monday Mr. Alfred Isom was exercising upon a species of trapezoid on a horizontal bar, on which he is quite an expert. In throwing himself from the cross pole to alight upon his feet, he made a miscalculation and struck upon the ground with his head. He injured his neck, which has been exceedingly painful and quite stiff since the occurrence.

Roads.—Brother E. R. Young arrived last evening from Washburn, Summit County. He reports that grasshoppers are not very numerous and doing but slight damage there.

The roads in Parley's and Silver Creek Canyons are in very bad travelling condition, rendering coal hauling to this city, which is being carried on quite extensively, very tedious and difficult. The hauling of coal by teams should be encouraged and made as easy as practicable. Those whose duty it is to see that the roads are kept in repair should attend to that important matter.

Post Mortem.—Last evening a post mortem examination was held upon the body of O. R. Rockwell by Drs. Benedict and Williamson, Drs. Thompson and Douglas being also present. The examination resulted in the conclusion that deceased "came to his death by a failure of the heart's action, caused by a suspension of the nervous power. There were no evidences of injury, nor any symptoms of poisoning."

Subsequently an inquest was held by Coroner Taylor and a jury, who rendered a verdict in harmony with the findings of the surgeons who conducted the post mortem examination.

The Abortion.—The examination of Dr. A. B. Splaney, before Justice Pyper, on a charge of procuring an abortion for Alice M. Todd, commenced last evening. Judge Z. Snow appeared for the prosecution and Messrs. Tifford and Hagan for the defendant. The prosecuting witness, Mrs. Todd, was examined, her testimony being substantially in accordance with the facts set forth in the affidavits, and as stated in yesterday's News. It is a case involving the most disgusting form of moral depravity. The examination was continued till this evening, at halfpast 7 o'clock, when the defense are expected to examine the witness who testified yesterday evening.

Mrs. Todd resides at present in the 11th Ward, and was in the 10th Ward, as heretofore stated.

CITY COUNCIL.

The Council met last evening, Mayor Little presiding.

Petition of Jonathan M. Russell, asking that a bargain be made by the Council with him, whereby he can locate as coal lands, about forty acres, near Knicker Park; also as to what portion of coal he is to pay to the city if coal be found. Referred to the committee on public grounds.

Petition of Phillip Hull, 15th Ward, asking that he be deeded a piece of land in the 15th Ward adjoine yard to repay him for five acres of land which he produced from the city and which he has been deprived of through reasons set forth. Referred to the committee on public grounds.

Petition from Wm. Ridd, stating that he had no means of ingress and egress to a certain lot on block 138, plat A, the same being stopped by a fence running across Sixth North street, between Second and Third West, and asking that Fifth North, between Third and Fourth West, and Third West, between Fifth and Sixth North streets be opened to the public. Referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

A communication was received from William Varley, explaining the great carelessness with which powder was unloaded at the powder magazines north of the Hot Springs, endangering the lives and property of the inhabitants in that neighborhood, and requesting that steps be taken for their protection. Referred to the City Marshal.

The auditor presented report of the finances of the City for the quarter ending May 31st, which showed a total of receipts during the quarter and balance on hand from the last quarter of \$38,000.09, disbursements during the quarter amounted to \$31,728.57. Received and referred to the committee on finance.

The committee on irrigation, to whom was referred the petition of T. J. Brown and other citizens, asking that a ditch be made to carry off high water near Seventh West Street, reported that a survey determined that the prayer of the petition was impracticable, and recommended, therefore, that it be not granted. Adopted.

The city assessor and collector presented a report accompanied by the city tax assessment roll for 1879, which showed the approximate valuation of the city property assessed by him to date, to be \$7,120,189.03. The report stated that on account of the limited time allowed him since the passage of the new ordinance on this subject, he had not been able to complete the assessment, and therefore asked further time to enable him to do so. The time was extended to Tuesday, August 13, 1879.

The Council decided to fix the rate of tax for the current year at one-half of 1 per cent.

Tuesday, August 13, at 2 p. m., was fixed as the time for the Council to sit as a board of equalization to hear and determine complaints, if any, relative to assessments.

The matter of the assessor and collector's compensation was referred to the committee on claims.

The council voted to appoint a committee of three to take into consideration matters pertaining to street lighting, the price of gas and the extension of gas pipes as contemplated in the company's charter.

The Mayor named Alderman Raleigh and Councilmen Cummings and Bookbush said committee.

One thousand dollars was appropriated to road and street account to be drawn upon the orders of the supervisor.

A bill for an ordinance relative to levying a special tax for extension of water mains was introduced and referred to the committee on municipal laws.

The ordinance in relation to "excavation and burying grounds" was referred to the committee on municipal laws, with a view to revision and amendment.

Adjourned for one week.

City Taxes.—It will be observed by the minutes of the proceedings of last night's City Council meeting, that the rate of taxation decided upon for city property is one-half of one per cent. This is a reduction on the rate of late years of one-fourth of one per cent.

It has been deemed better to lower the rate of general taxation and impose special taxes commensurate to the public improvements, in the localities in which they are made. We think this plan is fair and equitable and should meet with no objection from any source. It will place the weightier taxation upon those who are the most benefited by the expenditure of the public funds.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.
The Despatcher.
London, 12.—A dispatch from Antwerp says: A meeting of creditors, representing every mill except one, yesterday, unanimously favored submission to the master's terms, and decided to make every effort to terminate the strike.

For Spain.
The Duke of Cambridge has left London on his way to Madrid.

The Congress.
A Vienna correspondent says: The various governments have agreed that the discussions in congress shall be secret, but a committee will immediately be appointed to select a list of topics for the deliberations of the congress.

Congresses. Both in St. Petersburg and Berlin, in the successful issue of the congress is reported to be so deep a subject to exclude a doubt that Count Schouvaloff's policy is to bring the Russian and Prussian governments into closer relations, and the situation at Constantinople still continues a cause of uneasiness.

The weather continues unsettled and unpleasant.
There was a heavy fall of snow in Perthshire, Scotland, yesterday.

BRITISH AMERICA.
Canadian Organizes.

MONTREAL, 12.—The Orangemen of the city have resolved to celebrate the 12th of July by procession to church. The county and district masters have issued an advertisement, asking the Orangemen to comply strictly with the provisions of the late act, and go unarmed; play no party tunes in the streets, and will trust themselves to the protection which the laws of the city and other authorities afford all law-abiding persons. If, however, they are made to know they are outwitted, they will not be refused. Speaking for the orange body, they gladly join in abolishing all public processions except one distinctly Canadian.

St. Louis, 12.—The strikers have been plundering Renaud's flour store, in St. Paul's street, stopping the traffic on the street and forcing truckmen to assist them in carrying off their plunder. B. battery and the police are now dispersing the mob.

Later.—The riot is on the increase. The strikers now number some thousands. B. battery was forced to retreat, the riot act not having been read. The police, an adjutant, and some others of the men are badly cut with stones. The mob have broken into Renaud's store and stolen therefrom nearly two thousand barrels of flour, compelling carriers to take it away. The strikers are attempting to disperse the crowd, but without avail.

The riot act has just been read, firing commenced, one man is reported killed and several wounded. 3:30 p. m.—Several rioters and spectators are wounded. Captain Short and the Provost are badly cut with stones and some bullets. The rioters are dispersing. B. battery is guarding the Parliament House.

FRANCE.
Copyright Congress.
Paris, 12.—The international copyright congress opened yesterday, yesterday. M. About presided instead of Victor Hugo, who will speak at the close of the session.

GERMANY.
Turkish Non-Compliance.
Constantinople, 12.—The non-compliance of Turkey with the reiterated demand of Russia, supported by Germany, for the immediate surrender of Rumia, which had already caused the congress to be convened two weeks later than originally intended, threatens to create fresh difficulties.

The Societies.
There is reason to believe that the various societies against the circulation of socialist pamphlets are being circulated in Bremen.

Specie Increase.
The statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows an increase in specie of 4,577,000 marks.

The Emperor's Condition.
To-day's bulletin reports that the Emperor enjoyed an undisturbed and refreshing sleep throughout the night, and this morning sat up. The condition of his arm has decreased.

Arrivals.
Count Corti, the Italian plenipotentiary and "little arrived last night. Prince Gortschakoff arrived this morning.

RUSSIA.
The Emperor Very Weak.
St. Petersburg, 12.—To-day's bulletin reports the condition of the Emperor as follows: Fever and inflammation of the throat, and the patient's rest is disturbed and he does not gain strength. Public prayers are offered in the churches and all parts of Russia for the recovery of the Emperor.
