Valley of the Rockies Will be Full of Oratory With This Triumvirate Stumping.

Chicago, Sept. 9 .-- With the object of perfecting an organization and developing plans for an aggressive campaign in the Pacific states ,a meeting of the national committeemen and state chairmen of California, Oregon and Washington has been called by National Chairman Mack, to meet in Portland, Ore., on Sept. 16. The call was issued today following a conference of Mr. Mack and National Com-mitteeman Miller of Oregon, who discussed in a general way a plan to make an effective campaign in the far west. Mr. Mack is convinced from the reports which were made at the national committee meeting yesterday that there is an excellent chance of bringing the Pacific coast states into the Democratic column if a fight is made.

KERN COMING WEST.

Vice Presidential Candidate John W. Kern is expected to make several speeches west of the Rocky mountains, and Senator Gore of Oklahoma and Theodore A. While no definite announcement has been made at headquarters, it is generally believed by the national committeemen here that the latter part of Ocober will find Mr. Bryan campaigning along the Pacific. cific. BURGLARS' VICTIM DIES.

Sutherland Commits Suicide Just as Police Gct Drop on Him.

Los Angeles, Sept. 9.—Capiain Walter H, Auble of the Los Angeles police, who was shot three times at 9:30 this morning by Carl Sutherland, formerly a waiter and alleged burglar, died at 3:35 this afternoon from his wounds. Capt. Auble and Capt. of Detectives Flammer this morning went to the house where Sutherland was staying with Fred Horning, a chauffeur. It had come to the knowledge of the police that the men were planning to rob several houses in the city, and the arrests were to be made as a precautionary measure. The officers did not find the men at their room at 937 Georgia street, but encountered them at the corner of Ninth street and Grand avenue. Capt. Flammer walked up to Horning and announced that he was an officer and that Horning was uder arrest. Horning threw up his hands as if he intended to draw a gun and Flammer selzed him by the wrists, forcing him backward into a doorway. In the meantime Auble was attempting to arrest. Sutherland. Sutherland. In the meantime Auble was attempting to arrest Sutherland. Sutherland suddenly drew a revolver and fired three times in rapid succession. All three bullets took effect and Auble toppled over with the words, "I'm done

Flammer ran to Auble's assistance

Flammer ran to Aubie's assistance, leaving Horning to be taken care of by the crowd, but Sutherland had already made good his escape.

Aubie was quickly removed to the receiving hospital.

All the available police officers were put on Sutherland's trail and he was tracked to his room on Georgia street. Here it was discovered that Sutherland was wounded, but in what manner is

Here it was discovered that Sutherland was wounded, but in what manner is yet a mystery, as Auble had not been able to fire his gun after drawing it. After leaving his room Sutherland disappeared and has not yet been apprehended. Homing is in jall, where he disclaims any part of the affray. Sutherland was apprehended at 9 o'clock tonight at the home of Charles Weipe, a friend, at Moneta avenue and Seventy-seventh street, Sergeant Benedict, with two police officers, had gone to this place and were laying in wait for him. As he approached the house they ordered him to throw up his hands and covered him with their guns. Sutherland threw up his hands, one of which had a revolver. He dropped this, but with the other hand carried a vial to his lips and drank its contents. Two minutes later he was dead. The yial was found to have contained appealed of seates. 
