Col. Roosevelt at Banquet at Nairobi, Says Pioneers of Both Confront Same Conditions.

DOES A LITTLE LECTURING.

Remember That Righteousness and Ultimate Self Interest Demand That Blacks be Treated Justly.

Nairobi, British East Africa, Aug. 3.—Theodore Roosevelt and his son Kermit were guests of honor at a public banquet here tonight. Frederick J. Jackson, governor of British East Africa, was chairman and 176 persons sat at the table. Capt. Sanderson, town clerk, read an address of welcome to Mr. Roosevelt and afterwards handed him the address, enclosed in a section of elephant tusk mounted in silver and with a silver chain.

The American residents presented Mr. Roosevelt with a tobacco box made of the hoof of a rhinoceros, silver mounted; the skull of a rhinoceros, also mounted in silver, and a buffalo head.

Mr. Roosevelt, in reply to Gov. Jackson's toast said: "I wish to take this opportunity to thank the people of British East Africa for their generous and courteous hospitality. I have had a thorough good time.

"I am immensely interested in the country and its possibilities as an abode for white men. Very large tracts are fit for fine population and healthy and prosperous settlements, and it would be a calamity to neglect them.

"I believe that one of the best feats performed by members of the white race in the last 10 years is the building of the Uganda railroad. I am convinced that this country has a great agricultural and industrial future and it is the most attractive playground in the world. It most certainly presents excellent openings for capitalists and ample inducements should be offered them to come here. The home-maker and actual settler and not the speculator should be encouraged in making this a white man's country.

"Remember that righteousness and our real ultimate self-interest demand that the blacks be treated justly and I think that sentimentality does more harm to individuals than brutality. Therefore, I believe in helping the missionary, of whatever creed, who is laboring sincerely and disinterestedly with practical good sense.

"It is natural that I should have a peculiar feeling for the settlers. They remind me of the men in our west with whom I worked and in whose aspiration I so deeply sympathize."

Mr. Roosevelt compared the conditions as he had found them in British East Africa with those existing in the pioneers of western America.

HAZING AT WEST POINT UNDER INVESTIGATION
Washington, Aug. 3.—By the end of the week Col. Hugh L. Scott, the superintendent of the West Point military academy, who was in Washington today, expects to have in the hands of the war department a report on the hazing practise at the academy. This follows what apparently is a recrudescence of hazing with Cadet Roland Sutton, brother of former Lieut. James N. Sutton, whose death at the naval academy is now being investigated by a court of inquiry. Col. Scott said he had not determined what recommendation to make.

CONVICTS REPORT PROMPTLY FOR SERVICE
Huntsville, Ala., Aug. 4.—Robert Hughes, J. V. Vinson and H. Bohannon, white, and Dutch Greer, Dave Wyland and Will Powers, colored, have reported to the United States court here ready to begin serving prison sentences of six months each for violating the internal prison laws. At the last term of the federal court, Judge Hundley passed sentence on the men, but learning that their families would suffer if the prisoners were confined in the penitentiary, he paroled them to their home to make their crops and come back. Every paroled man came back as he promised.

LIEUT. U. S. GRANT III.
Assumes Duties as Superintendent of State, War and Navy Building.
Washington, Aug. 4.—First Lieut. Ulysses S. Grant III, corps of engineers, grandson of President Grant, has reported at the war department and formally assumed his new duties as superintendent of the state, war and navy building.

The detail as superintendent of the "largest office building in the world," is made by joint action of the secretaries of state, war and navy, and was given to Lieut. Grant on the recommendation of Gen. Marshall, chief of engineers.

Lieut. Grant formerly served as an aide to President Roosevelt and he may be assigned to similar duty with President Taft this winter, in connection with his other duties.

WOMAN LOSES THE SAVINGS OF MANY YEARS
Chicago, Aug. 4.—Mrs. Anna Childs of Washington, reported the loss of \$2,000 yesterday while on the way to Chicago on a Pennsylvania railroad train. Mrs. Childs is well known in Washington.

She was bringing the money, which she had saved during a long period of years while she was a milliner in Washington, to her son, Edward Childs, of Clyde, Ill. The money was for a present to him to assist him in paying for a home. The money is believed to have been taken from her berth while she was in a washroom.

CHICAGO'S GREAT RECORD FOR SUICIDES AND MURDERS
Chicago, Aug. 4.—The increase in murders and suicides during the past few months is due in a measure to the heat, Coroner Hoffman declared yesterday. His report for July showed 27 suicides and 12 murders, the heat of the latter being murder and suicide. Twenty-four murders and 45 suicides were reported in June.

BARELY AVOIDED EXPLOSION ON MINE PLANTER
New York, Aug. 4.—Fears of a disastrous explosion on the United States mine-planter, Gen. R. E. Frank, have been dispelled by the conquering of a mine which cost \$20,000 damage. The Frank ran on a rock near New London recently and was sent to Jersey City to be repaired. Machinists accidentally set fire to some cotton waste in one of the holds and were driven to the deck by the smoke. The first fireman to arrive were informed that a number of fully-loaded submarine mines were stored in the vessel and

for a long time there was considerable anxiety. When the fire had been extinguished it was found that the damage was confined principally to the machinery used in planting submarine mines.

LINCOLN PENNIES NOT POPULAR
Washington, Aug. 4.—The Lincoln pennies are not so popular as the treasury officials had hoped for. Artists have always declared that a penny superior in design to the Indian penny could not be turned out, and it is claimed that the Lincoln penny is a practical demonstration of that statement.

The new pennies are being subjected to criticism by others than artists. It was first discovered at the treasury that they did not stack up as well as the Indian coins.

The most serious objections to them, however, is that they are thicker than the old coins. Institutions which use coin machines have already begun complaining that the new pennies do not fit in the machines.

LEGS BOKEN BY EXPLODING SODA FOUNTAIN
Chicago, Aug. 4.—Gustavus Gallas, proprietor of a candy store was thrown against a counter and suffered fractures of both legs last night when a soda water fountain exploded in his store.

Newport, R. I., Aug. 4.—Ida Lewis, "The Grace Darling of America," who from Limerock lighthouse saved the lives of 15 persons, added five more lives to her splendid record last night. A rowboat with five girls was capsized by a passing steamer. Ida Lewis is 85 years old, and for 30 years has kept burning the light of Limerock.

ECONOMIC CAUSES AFFECTING COMMERCIAL CENTERS
Washington, Aug. 4.—Economic causes which affect commercial centers throughout the world during 1903 had a serious effect on the countries composing the international union of American republics, as shown by figures compiled by the International Bureau of American Republics.

The aggregate of trade for the various countries during 1908 was \$4,548,019,947, against \$2,415,798,197 in the preceding year, a loss of \$550,000,000. In this total for the year the share of the United States is represented by \$2,569,282,928 as compared with \$3,349,56,925 in 1907. A decrease of \$77,313,097 being indicated. Latin-America figured in the grand total for \$1,977,787,019, showing a decline of \$89,647,889 in the trade volume as compared with 1907.

Imports into America of Latin-American goods during 1908 showed a decline of \$107,043,354, while on the other hand exports show a gain of \$15,795,731 over 1907.

The figures show that in spite of certain adverse conditions in the financial world the demand for and the export of the imports created a trade balance in favor of the producing countries to the extent of \$191,239,024, to which extent the exports for the year exceeded the imports. In the year's total for Latin-America the United States share was \$488,216,455, as compared with \$558,279,201 in 1907.

ALIENISTS SAY THAW IS INSANE
Drs. Austin Flint, William Hirsch And Amos T. Baker So Testify on Witness Stand.

PARANOIACS NEVER RECOVER.
Answers Were Given in Reply to District Attorney Jerome's Hypothetical Question.

White Plains, N. Y., Aug. 3.—Three alienists united in the supreme court today to make it unpleasant for Harry K. Thaw, who killed Stanford White and was adjudged insane, but now demands release from the Matteawan asylum as a mentally normal man.

All three testified that he was insane, and when Thaw took the stand briefly, after some disconcerting testimony, he was plainly ruffled and nervous, but Mr. Jerome dismissed him after a few comparatively unimportant questions.

Of the alienists who testified, Dr. Flint, Dr. William Hirsch and Dr. Amos T. Baker, the last named gave testimony of the most importance. He is acting superintendent of Matteawan and appears as a witness without compensation. Justice Mills called attention to this fact and took a hand in questioning him. Dr. Baker said that in his opinion Thaw was insane now and a dangerous person to be at large.

It was shortly after this declaration that Mr. Jerome quickly called Thaw to the stand. He was pale and apparently shaken. The district attorney put some rather incoherent notes written by the prisoner in evidence and asked him to explain them. After parries back and forth and laborious explanations by Thaw as to the meaning of certain writings, he said: "I want you to know, Mr. Jerome, that many of these notes call suggestions were written at the request of my lawyers."

Mr. Jerome said: "Do you mean to sit there and tell us, who observed you in both homicide trials, that you did not believe you knew more about the case than your lawyers?" "I do," replied Thaw. "You were nice and docile all the time?" "I think I behaved myself."

"Never discharged any lawyers?" "Oh yes; I discharged some lawyers." "And yet you did not interfere at all?" "Only when I thought it was absolutely necessary."

"Then you did offer some suggestions, I take it," said the district attorney sarcastically. "Oh, yes, some," was the reply. Dr. Hirsch described a paranoiac as a person dominated by certain delusions, whose mental and physical state might not otherwise be affected, except insofar as these delusions influence him.

"Paranoiacs," he concluded impressively, "never recover." Dr. Hirsch varied the general verdict by declaring Thaw a "degenerate paranoiac."

Charles Morschauer, Thaw's attorney, attacked this testimony with every legal expedient. In Dr. Flint's case he endeavored to show that he had given contradictory testimony in two previous cases where he appeared as an expert.

AEROPLANES.
Glen Curtiss Answers Objections of Military Men to Them.
New York, Aug. 4.—Glen H. Curtiss, the aeroplane pilot, declares that the objection of military authorities to flying machines, on the theory that they cannot ascend sufficiently high to be out of range of guns, is without foundation.

"There are only two things at present which are retarding long continued high flights by aeroplanes," Curtiss said. "The first thing is the nerve of the operator and the second the fear that the motor will suddenly stop or develop other troubles that might make a quick descent from a high elevation dangerous. As soon as the motor trouble can be overcome, the nerve of the operator will be found. The aeroplane motor is still in its experimental stage. It is not the fear of meeting troublesome cross-currents of air in the highest regions that retards high flying. The trouble is with the motor. It has been lightened and simplified to the last degree possible by the elimination of as many parts as possible from the heavier and more reliable motor as used in automobiles, and yet we expect it to show an equally high degree of efficiency."
