SOUTH AFRICA AND **WESTERN AMERICA**

Col. Roosevelt, at Banquet at Nairobi, Says Pioneers of Both Confront Same Conditions.

DOES A LITTLE LECTURING.

Remember That Rightcourness and Ultimate Self Interest Demand That Blacks be Treated Justily.

Nairobi, British East Africa, Aug. 3.-Theodore Roosevelt and his son Kermit were guests of honor at a public banquet here tonight. Frederick J. Jackson, governor of British East Africa, was chairman and 175 persons sat at the table. Capt, Sanderson, town clerk, read an address of welcome to Mr. Roosevelt and a crwards handed him the address, enclosed in a section of elephant tusk mounted in silver and with a silver chain.

The American residents presented Mr. Roosevent with a tobacco box made of the hoof of a rhinoceros, silver mounted; the skull of a rhinoceros, also mounted in silver, and a buffalo head.

Mr. Roosevelt, in reply to Gov. Jackson's toast said;
"I wish to take this opportunity to thank the people of British East Africa for their generous and cour-

teous hospitality. I have had a thor-ough good time. I am immensely interested in the country and its possibilities as an abode for white men. Very large tracts are fit for fine population and healthy and prosperous settlements, and it would be a calamity to neglect

them.
"I believe that one of the best feats "I believe that one of the best feats performed by members of the white race in the last 10 years is the building of the Uganda railroad. I am convinced that this country has a great agricultural and industrial future and it is the most attractive playground in the world. It most certainly presents excellent openings for capitalists and ample inducements should be offered them to come here. The homemaker and actual settler and not the speculator should be encouraged in making this a white man's country.

"Remember that righteousness and our real ultimate self-interest demand that the blacks be treated justly and I think that sentimentality does more harm to individuals that brutality. Therefore, I believe in helping the missionary, of whatever creed, who is laboring sincerely and disinterestedly with practical good sense.

"It is natural that I should have a peculiar feeling for the settlers. They remind me of the men in our west with whom I worked and in whose with whom I worked and in whose aspiration I so deeply sympathize."

Mr. Roosevelt compared the conditions as he had found them in British Dast Africa with those confronting the pioneers of western America.

ECONOMIC CAUSES AFFECT-ING COMMERCIAL CENTERS

Washington, Aug. 4.—Economic causes which affected commercial centers throughout the world during 1903 had a serious effect on the countries composing the international union of American republics, as shown by figures complied by the International Bureau of American Republics.

The aggregate of trade for the various countries during 1908 was \$4,548,019,947, against \$5,415,798,197 in the praceding year, a loss of \$550,000,000. In the total for the year the share of the United States is represented by \$2,869,282,928 as compared with \$3,346,96,025 in 1907, a decrease of \$477,313,097 being in-1907, a decrease of \$477,313,097 being indicated. Latin-America figured in the grand total for \$1,977,737,019, showing a decline of \$59,647,589 in the trade volume as compared with 1907.

Imports into America of Latin-American goods during 1908 showed a decline of \$107,043,854, while on the other hand exports show a gain of \$15,789,731 over 1907.

The figures show that in spite of

The figures show that in spite of certain adverse conditions in the fluancial world the demand for articles of Latin-American origin created a trade balance in favor of the producing countries to the extent of \$191,229,024, to which extent the exports for the year exceeded the imports. In the year's total for Latin-America the United States share was \$468,216,455, as compared with \$558,279,201 in 1907. pared with \$558,279,201 in 1907.

ALIENISTS SAY THAW IS INSANE

Drs. Austin Flint, William Hirsch And Amos T. Baker So Testify on Witness Stand.

PARANOIACS NEVER RECOVER.

Answers Were Given in Reply to District Attorney Jerome's Hypothetical Question.

White Plains, N. Y., Aug. 3 .- Three ilienists united in the supreme court today to make it unpleasant for Harry K. Thaw, who killed Stanford White and was adjudged insane, but now demands release from the Matteawan asylum as a mentally normal man. All three testified that he was in sane, and when Thaw took the stand briefly, after some disconcerting testimony, he was plainly ruffled and ner-

but Mr. Jerome dismissed him

after a few comparatively unimportant

questions Of the alienists who testified, Dr Flint, Dr. William Hirsch and Dr Amos T. Baker, the last named gave testimony of the most importance. He is acting superintendent of Matteawan and appears as a witness without compensation. Justice Mills called attention to this fact and took a hand in questioning him. Dr. Baker said that in his opinion Paaw was insane now and a dangerous person to be at large. It was shortly after this declaration that Mr. Jerome quickly called Thaw to the stand. He was pale and apparently shaken. The district attorney put some rather incoherent notes written by the prisoner in evidence and asked him to explain them. After parries back and forth and laborious explanations by Thaw as to the meaning of certain writings, he said:

"I want you to know, Mr. Jerome, that many of these notes you call suggestions were written at the request of my lawyers."

Dr. Hirsch varied the general verdict by declaring Thaw a "degenerate paranolacus".

AEROPLANES.

Glen Curtiss Answers Objections of Military, Men to Them.

New York, Aug. 4.—Glen H. Curtiss, the aeroplanist, declares that the objection of military authorities to flying-machines, on the theory that they cannot ascend sufficiently high to be out of range of guns, is without foundation

"There are only two things at preent which are retarding long continued high flights by aeroplanes," Curtiss said. "The first thing is the nerve of said. "The first thing is the nerve of the operator and the second the fear that the motor will suddenly stop or develop other troubles that might make a quick descent from a high elevation dangerous. As soon as the motor trouble can be overcome, the nerve of the operator will be found. The aeroplane motor is still in its experimental stage. It is not the fear of meeting troublesome cross-currents of air in the highest regions that retards high flying. The trouble is with the motor. It has been lightened and simplified to the last degree possible by the climination of as many parts as possible from the nat degree possible by the character as many parts as possible from the heavier and more reliable motor as used in automobiles, and yet we expect it to show an equally high degree of efficiency."


