Mr. Alexander H. Stevens is reported to have received an offer of twenty-five thousand dollars for the first volume of his "War among the States."

In Australia they have fenced in 10,000 acres, where ostriches are kept, and it is found that the feathers of a full grown bird will sell for \$100.

The widow of Samuel Colt, the pistol maker, has erected to his memory, at Hartford, Conn., a beautiful house of worship, called, the "Church of the Good Shepherd."

A bridal party in Newport indulged in so much liquid festivity on the way to the clergyman's that both bride and bridegroom spent the night unmarried at the station house.

The leader of the war party in Athens is young Queen Olga, who, by her beauty and winning ways, has acquired great popularity, and constantly avails herself of her influence to stimulate the hatred of the Greeks against the Turks.

The father of Baron Bunsen, ashrewd and humble-born German, sent his son into the wide world with this advice as a precepture:

"In clothing live up to your means, in food below your means, and in dwelling above your means. Don't be a soldier stand erect before a man with a sword."

A British volunteer at a rifle practice represented as remarking, after firing the shot:

"Well, I would have sworn I hit the bull that time."

The *Advocate* says the tobacco-using question is attracting increased attention in the churches. The church at Hallow sends us a resolution expressing the opinion that this habit is "an evil scarcely secondary to the use of alcoholic liquors, and one which Christians should, by precept and example, and in all proper ways discountenance."

M. Eugene Godard, the aeronaut, has just been summoned to Cherbourg, by order of the Minister of Marine, to make experiments on his system of aerial telegraphy on board vessels of the Iron-clad squadron. This decision of the Minister is said to have been determined by the success of the trials made by M. E. Godard and his wife at the Camp of Chalons last summer.

The Young Men's Christian Association, at its session at St. Louis, discussed the question, "Why do so many Churches fail to reach the poor?" Their conclusion was, fine buildings and high rates, and they recommend the erection of plainer houses, and the raising of expenses by subscriptions, so as to abolish all money distinctions in the house of God.

The First Positivist Society of New York has just been organized, and declares the first three principles of its creed to be these: Theology is not credible; theology is no longer an element of progress; science is the reliance of all. Infidelity has thus assumed a tangible form, with the avowed purpose of banishing all faith in God's revelation, and discarding Christianity as a fable.

The Spanish Crown has been refused by Prince Alfred, of England, Ferdinand of Portugal (father of the Portuguese king) the Duke of Aosta, and Don Fernando. A republican form of government seems not to meet with general favor, and a Bourbon they will not tolerate. As a last resort, they are said to be looking to the Duke de Victoria, an old man of seventy-six—anybody rather than Isabella.

The "Redemptionists," or Roman Catholic revivalists, have just closed a mission of five weeks with St. Stephen's Church, in New York, with great success, 9,000 women and 6,000 men having received the holy eucharist during the meetings. On Sunday evening the mission terminated with the ceremony known as the "renewal of the baptism vows," during which the entire congregation present—some 6,000 men—stood up, and elevating their right hands, solemnly repeated the vows made at their baptism by their sponsors.

The most ancient of plantations laid out at Paris is that of the Champs Elysees, which goes back to 1614. Care is taken to replace the trees where they have fallen, and no precaution is neglected to preserve them from the ravages of insects. On the ancient exterior boulevards occasional veterans of the vegetable kingdom are to be met with more than a century old, and which have attained a magnificent size. To prevent their decay, the ground around the trunks is being removed, and the vacancy filled up with fresh earth of excellent quality. A similar operation is going on for all the new plantations.

Mrs. Grant, it is reported, proposes not to make her home at the White House, but rather to remain in her present residence, which is a home entirely to her taste and wishes. She will go to the White House on state occasions, etc., but for all other purposes the Executive Mansion will probably become a mere office for the President. Gen. Grant's house, by the way, is worth at least \$60,000. He has, besides, a farm of 88 acres, worth \$2,000 per acre, within the city limits. His real estate at St. Louis, Galena and Philadelphia is worth \$100,000 more, and \$300,000 is said to be a fair estimate of his "total valuation." He is also interested in business through other parties, and altogether, is in a fair way to have a comfortable living.

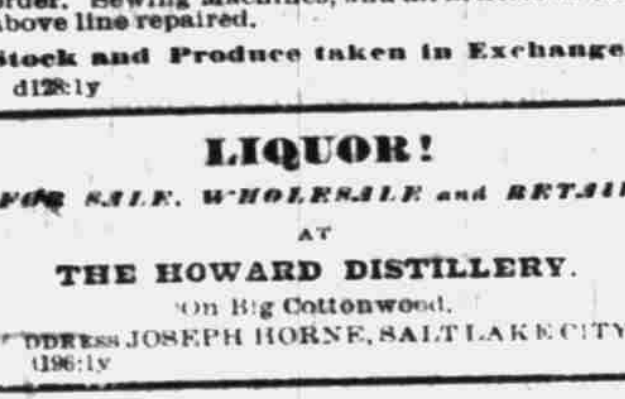
