taking a position in the third
division of the army. The
signal for heavy cheering, waving
of hands and other demonstrations
of applause as he rode along.

Immediately preceding his
cavalry division under the command
of the President, the additional
military part of it consisted
of the President's mounted guard
of this city, the Governor's mounted
guard, Boston lancers, the Vice
President's mounted guard, and the
division of the procession consisted
of military organizations, cadets
from West Point, midshipmen from
Annapolis, U. S. artillery on foot, a
battalion of U. S. marines, the old
guard of New York, company A of
the St. Louis national guards, sev-
eral volunteer organizations of
Washington. The first division con-
sisting of U. S. troops commanded
by Gen. Upton.

Among the organizations in
the 4th division were some from Phila-
delphia, Albany, Baltimore, Du-
quesne, the grays of Pittsburgh and
five bands of music.

The 5th division was the 2nd
Cavalry, A. N. Y., and N. J., 5th
Maryland regiments.

6th division consisted of colored
troops, who presented a creditable
appearance.

The remaining part of the pro-
cession was divided into six divi-
sions. They were led by Marshal
Field, the members of the Wash-
ington fire department. This divi-
sion included the officers of the
general and local governments, po-
litical clubs from different States,
from Washington and Baltimore,
the Schuylers, Verelins, etc.

A large mounted squad of police
preceded the procession and kept the
crowd from encroaching on the
line of the march. Altogether
the civil and military organizations
numbered at least twelve thousand,
and the procession was imposing.

Nearly every organization in the
march was accompanied by an ef-
ficient band, and the route was
enlivened by excellent music for a
space nearly two miles in length.

SENATE.
The Senate reconvened at 9.30 a.
m., but there was no quorum. A
brief recess was taken, after which
a number of local bills were passed.
At 11.15 the Senate offered a resolu-
tion which was agreed to, for the
appointment of a committee of two
to wait upon the President to in-
form him that unless he had some
further communication to the Sen-
ate, the two Houses having finished
the business before them, were ready
to adjourn.

HOUSE.
WASHINGTON, 4.—The House
met at 9.30.
The Senate bill in aid of the ex-
ecution of the laws in Utah was
passed.
The Senate bill to provide a board
of commissioners to report a system
of irrigation for the San Joaquin,
Sacramento and Tulare Valley Cal.,
was passed.
The Senate bill to authorize the
Texas Pacific railroad Co., to con-
nect with certain military reserva-
tions, and other railroad lines in California,
except through lines to the Pacific
Ocean &c., was called up.
Holman opposed the bill as tend-
ing to the creation of a great rail-
road monopoly, and it was defeated,
yeas 89 nays 78, not a two-thirds
vote in the affirmative.
Banks, from the committee on
rules reported a rule to increase
the number of standing committees.
