EMMA COPPER AGAIN GETS INTO TROUBLE

Sheriff Posts Signs for Sale of Property To Satisfy Judgment in Favor Of Machinery House.

More trouble is apparently ahead of the Emma Copper company at Alta and the idea that the property would be sold to satisfy certain creditors, has caused considerable comment among the mining men of the city. The company has had a tempestuous career and since it was launched something over four years ago it has had a hard time to keep up. The latest side of the case is the posting of notices on the property by the sheriff offering it for sale to satisfy a judgment in favor of the Utah Mining Machinery & Supply company for approximately \$1,100. Whether the sale of the property will be consummated or not is yet to be seen as a number of the stockholders contend that they will see the company through.

The company at the time it was formed was looked upon as a property of considerable merit and among the stockholders and directors were such men as C. W. Whitely, D. C. Jackling and Samuel Nelson. It was not long after the formation of the company was formed that they withdrew and charges of misrepresentation were made.

It is understood that there are several other creditors of the company that now threaten to take other measures to obtain their money. In the city court at the present time a number of suits have been filed and at present three judgments are of record. John G. Sullivan has secured judgment against the Emma Copper company for \$412 and \$5.20 costs; Edward Nelson \$77.75, \$10.87 interest and \$2.30 costs; L. E. Destain, \$136 and \$5.20 costs.

That an effort is being made by the company to stem the tide is shown by satisfying the judgments in the city court. The only one now against the company in the court is the one in favor of Edward Nelson.

At the time of the annual meeting it was given out that the company had 25,000 shares of stock in the treasury with which to proceed with the development work this year. It was also asserted that the company was going to do some very satisfactory work this summer. The officers of the company are John A. Kirby, president; Joseph Lippman, vice president; W. M. Wantland, secretary; Harry S. Joseph, treasurer, and H. S. Cobb, assistant secretary. The officers with Horace E. Peery form the directors.

The company owns 10 claims, has bonds on properties and has an estate of about 70 acres. The company soon after it was organized was in trouble and it appears as though it has never fairly extracted itself since.

POOR WEEK FOR STOCKS.

Market is Just Half of What the Bustiest Week This Year Did.

The slowest week of the year was registered when the Salt Lake Stock & Mining exchange closed today. It was just half of what was done during the busiest week this year. The total number of stocks sold this week was 579,725, and the amount represented was \$290,144.79. The total number of shares of stock sold today was 63,300, while the amount represented was \$38,824.45.

Improvement today showed considerable improvement yesterday, and the volume was more of a demand for several of the stocks. Iron Blossom was busy again today and the price was a great improvement. The stocks sold at a low price from \$1.40 to \$1.15. Trading was not as heavy in this stock as it has been at other times of the year.

Colorado came down a few cents more today and sold at \$2.07. Black Jack is still low as are most all other stocks on the board.

On the curb market a number of stocks made their appearance, but there was no trading. A bid of 25¢ cents was made for Blingh, Colorado, standard and 9¢ cents was bid for Enst. Price. The stock was offered at 10 cents. Eureka Swinsea Extension was offered at 13 cents. Tintic Standard was offered at 12½ cents.

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SACRAMENTO MILL IS NOW TREATING ORE

Great Dumps of Old Bonanza Being Handled to Bring Out the Last Values from the Once Rich Rock.

(Special to the "News.")
Mercur, June 25.—The Sacramento tailings are being worked over at present. Rapid headway will be made from now on. The Sacramento dumps have an average thickness of 175 feet and a height of approximately 140 feet. Tanks, bins, scrapers and all the paraphernalia, including the automatic feeder, are included in the equipment. It is estimated that he of service in the treating and testing of ore characteristic of this part of the state of Utah. The works are all new material, illustrating the mechanical skill of its builders, under the supervision and direction of L. H. Hunt, general manager and president of the Utah-Nevada Mines and Milling company. Mr. Hunt is a graduate of the Missouri school of mines, and is the plant and designer of the new plant, which is situated in Sacramento gulch, about one mile southwest of Mercur. The tanks, each holding 30 tons of slime, are situated in a row along the gold camp of Mercur, at a 12,000 gallon tank for solution storage, and an 18,000 gallon tank for water storage have been provided. The tailings are scraped into a small bin of 150 on capacity, with scrapers. From the bin the ore is fed into the mixer classifier by the automatic feeder. These classifiers are designed for a capacity of 300 tons of ore per day. This output then runs into the second mixer classifier, while the fine slime runs into and through a pipe to the six-foot cone classifier, and from this to the three large tanks aforementioned. Slimes are settled there and rich solutions are decanted off to the gold tank—12½ feet from which it is sent, through four zinc boxes, to a sump, 18½ feet from the tank. It is pumped to the solution storage tank, by a three-inch centrifugal pump.

SENT TO THE FILTER.

Settled slimes are sent to the filter,

where the excess solution is taken out

and slimes are discharged on the old

dump.

The machine shop and carpenter

shop are filled with plans and speci-
