FOR CIVIL ENGINEERS.

There will be a civil service examion in this city April 3, for the posi-of civil engineer student, depart-t of agriculture, at \$500 per annum. Subsistence expenses, not to exceed 39 days on any one assignment, and all traveling expenses will be paid by the department. The object of this exam-ination is to qualify young engineer stu-dents for a one-year graduate course in highway engineering. Part of the time will be devoted to laboratory and office work and study, and the remainder to practical road building in different parts of the United States, thus en-abling the student to become familiar Subsistence expenses, not to exceed

parts of the United States, thus en-abling the student to become familiar with all branches in this line of work. Upon the expiration of the year's course, the student may be promoted to an engineering position without further examination, such promotion being de-pendent upon individual merit and the needs of the service.

The governor in 1905, gave the college credit for doing more good than any other institution in the state.




