

BRITT AND NELSON IN THE LIMELIGHT.

Two Noted Fighters Are Now
Center of Pugilistic At-
tractions.

FIRST LARGE BET IS MADE.

Prominent Horsemen Favors "Native
Son" While Miner Puts His Cash
On the Durable Dane.

When James Edward Britt, "Native
Son" of California, and claimant to the
lightweight championship, and Battling
Nelson, known as the Durable Dane,
crash through the ropes to battle in a
twenty round Queensbury argument, they
will face one of the greatest crowds of
fans that have ever assembled to watch
a couple of pugilists push mites into each
others' countenance.

It is now practically settled that Jimmy
Britt will offer a \$20,000 purse and
\$100,000 prize money, while Battling
Nelson will offer a \$20,000 purse and
\$100,000 prize money. The fight will be
held at the Coliseum in San Francisco
on the 15th inst.

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The first big bet on the coming
contest between Britt and Nelson that has
been heard of was placed by Zick Abraham
last night. A mining man from
Pueblo and a well known horse man
were arguing the abilities of the two men,
and as usual in such cases and in such
circumstances, the result was a bet. The
horseman favored Britt while the mining
man favored Nelson. The wager was \$100
with Britt the one at odds on.

It is said that settlement may have
been reached somewhat within recent days,
for had this wager been made a few
weeks ago it is almost certain that Nel-
son would have been the favorite over
Britt. When these two do get together
there will probably be more money wa-
gaged on the result than has been
wagered in any ring contest for years. It
may be added that the wager is contin-
ued on the fight taking place within
sixty days from this date.

hardest kind of a test-out.

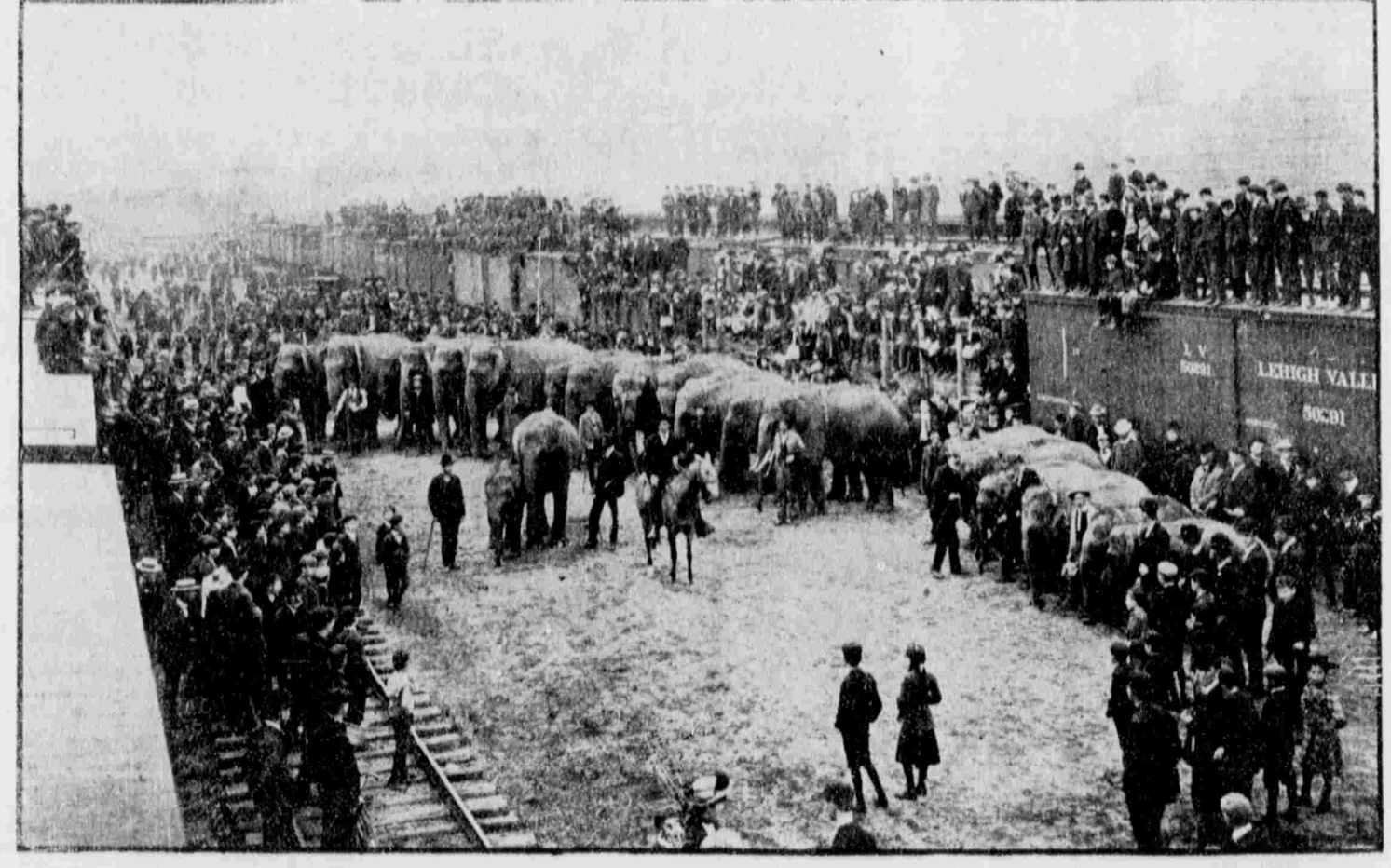
James E. Sullivan, secretary and treas-
