TRAFFIC BUREAU ELECTION.

First Annual Meeting Held and Three New Directors Chosen.

The first annual meeting of the traffic bureau of the Commercial club was held last night, the election of four directors to succeed the charter members and the receiving of the report of S. H. Babcock, commissioner of traffic, being the leading features of the evening. Over sixty members were present with Vice-president C. N. Strevell in the chair.

The new directors named were W. E. Bailey, William Bowen, and W. F. Jensen while J. G. McDonald was reelected. The three retiring directors are C. A. Quigley, H. F. Redman and C. N. Strevell, who were given a vote of thanks by the bureau for their efficient services.

The new board of directors will meet next week and officers and the bureau will hold monthly meetings in the future on the second Thursday at 8 p. m. It was also decided to give a banquet some time within the next month.

The meeting went along with a great hurrah and was untempered by the shades of experimentalism and is established on a firm basis. The report of Commissioner Babcock, reviewing his past work in conjunction with Judge C. C. Day, and particularly the Utah rate case which is now before the interstate commerce commission, was listened to with keen interest.

Emma Rogers, Daughter of A. H. Rogers, Attempts Suicide in Public Place in Los Angeles.

(Special to The News.)

Los Angeles, Nov. 8.—A domed condition resultant from an unhappy marriage caused Emma Rogers, daughter of A. H. Rogers, a merchant of Salt Lake, to attempt suicide in the chamber of commerce this afternoon. She shot herself twice in the body in a vain attempt to reach the heart, both wounds being so slight as to prove to be not serious, but painful.

The attempt took place while an exhibit was in progress on the main floor of the chamber. Two shots were heard and their source finally traced to a lavatory. There Miss Rogers was found upon the floor with a smoking revolver by her side. She was removed to a hospital where her wounds were dressed. When recovered physically she will be taken before a board of inquiry to inquire as to her physical condition.

Miss Rogers is the daughter of A. H. Rogers of this city, residing at 121 south First West, and was born and educated in Salt Lake. About five years ago she went to Los Angeles on a visit to her uncle, Dr. J. F. Rogers. There she became acquainted with C. W. Powers, a photographer whom she married after a short courtship. After two years of wedded life, which the father declares to have been unhappy, she was granted a divorce.

Locals are shocked over the affair and say that they had no knowledge of any dementia on the part of Miss Rogers. They attribute the deed to sorrow over her marital unhappiness.
