**Senator Bamberger Inspects Route
And Will Push Project to
Early Completion.**

A PAINFUL GUN ACCIDENT.

**Cellars Burglary Charge Dismissed—
Michael Berlin Gives Bail—Telle
Peterson Goes to University.**

Ogden, Utah, June 24.—Senator Simon Bamberger, of Salt Lake City, was in Ogden yesterday and went over the route of his proposed electric line from Ogden City to the mouth of Ogden canyon, for which the engineers have just completed the survey. He is quite satisfied with the work done. It will take considerable time to complete the grade work which he expects to commence next week. The grade from Ogden to the mouth of the canyon will not be very heavy, and will be pushed with every possible haste. After going to the canyon Mr. Bamberger went over the route to Layton from Ogden. On this work some very heavy grading will have to be done in several places, which will take much longer than the other work and will be quite expensive. He does not expect to have the entire track laid between here and Farmington before January. It will be the beginning of the middle of next summer before the electric cars will be running between Salt Lake City and Ogden, as it will take several months to complete the grading and the laying of the tracks. Mr. Bamberger is much pleased with the \$500,000 franchise granted him by the legislature for the proposed line. He is especially gratified with the purchase he made of the Winslow place resort in Ogden canyon, where he will make one of the most beautiful summer resorts in the west. The transfer of the Winslow resort to Mr. Bamberger for \$7,500 was made yesterday by J. H. Winslow.

DEATH OF OLD-TIME MINER.

Serious Accident in Tullin-Beck-Juan County Valuations.

Eureka, June 23.—Thomas R. Short, a pioneer miner of Tintic district, died at Silver City Thursday morning from the effects of a fall. He was walking over the trail from Robinson to Silver City in company with Harry Elmer, and while sitting on a log, he suddenly slipped and fell backwards, striking his head on a rock. He was taken to the hospital and died after a few hours' suffering. Mr. Short was 52 years of age and came to Silver City in 1884, where he remained ever since. He was heavily interested in several of the mines and prospects of Tintic, and was well known to nearly all the mining men of Utah. He was a genial, well-to-do man, and had a host of friends. Deceased was a single man. Funeral services were conducted at Silver City this afternoon by Bishop Daniel Connelly of the Tintic district. The body was laid at rest in the Eureka City cemetery.

BENEFIT BALL.

A ball game was played this afternoon at the ball park between the Eureka champions and a picked team for the benefit of Captain "Big" Taylor, who sustained a severe fracture of the ribs by being run into by a player at the game played on May 14. Mr. Taylor is in a very serious condition and will have to undergo an operation. The Eureka band gave a concert at the park and about 1,500 people were present, as the business houses all closed to allow the employees to attend.

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TONS OF FISH DESTROYED.

Stranded in River Bed—Canyon Full of Tramps—Court Cases.

Provo, Utah, June 24.—Silt has been commenced in the Fourth district court by James D. Houston against the Rio Grande Western Railway company for \$5,000 damages for being put off the train by the conductor at Provo, on Feb. 20, 1905, although he had a ticket which he claimed was a good one.

The Telluride Power company has commenced condemnation proceedings against Mrs. Susanna M. Steele to condemn about seven acres of land in the mouth of Provo canyon for the operation of plaintiff's power plant. The land in question is the land involved in the suit for trespass brought by Mrs. Steele against the power company, and tried a short time ago. Mrs. Steele was awarded damages in the sum of \$600.

LLOYD DIVORCE SUIT.

A suit for divorce has been filed in the Second district court by Irma Webb Lloyd against William W. Lloyd. The parties were married in Ogden Nov. 24, 1901, and have two children. The complaint alleges that the defendant has failed to provide his family with the necessities of life, for some time past, hence the suit for divorce.

NO CLUE TO BURGLARS.

Sheriff Bailey and Sgt. Wilson have returned home from Tremont, Rockwell county, where they went in the night of the 22nd to crack the safes of the Consolidated Wagon & Machine company, and the Western Lumber company. However, they were unsuccessful in their efforts and it is supposed the men boarded a train somewhere in the near vicinity and made for Portland. While waiting at McCammon for a train, the officers stopped into a saloon and around 10 o'clock a man with whom he had quarreled, the shot went wild of the mark and the man fled. No arrests were made.

At a cost of \$500 the Miller-Cahoon company intends building a water system which will aid in protecting the company from loss by fire. The plans are to sink an artesian well, connecting it with a tank which will force the water through a pipe to a 10,000 gallon tank that will be erected near the warehouse. Hose will connect the tank, yards, and buildings, so that the system can be put into active operation in case of fire.

A gasoline engine is also being operated by the company in connection with the wells, an experiment which is proving successful. This will be of interest to farmers whose water supply is limited as it can be run at a minimum cost.

A mass meeting of all farmers injured by the smaller funes was called Monday evening, so that a petition asking for a reduction of rates could be gotten up, and be presented to the board of equalization Tuesday, June 19. The board has taken the matter under advisement.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

At the city council meeting Tuesday night a resolution was passed recommending an amendment to the city ordinance requiring all streets to be 50 feet wide before being accepted. A resolution was also passed accepting the official census taken by the department appointed at the previous session. According to this census the total population is 5,536.

Former Road Supervisor of the Twenty-fourth District, E. D. Simpson, was appointed assistant road supervisor at a salary of \$3.25 per day. A wage bill was allowed and a fumigating bill was paid.

The city has decided to build a water tank within its limits. The city attorney was requested to investigate the complaint charging the proprietor of the shooting gallery with maintaining a nuisance. People in the immediate neighborhood fear that it is dangerous.

Stratton, the duly elected, qualified and acting mayor of Murray City, Salt Lake county, State of Utah, do hereby certify that according to a census duly and regularly ordered and taken, which said census was accepted and approved of by the city council of Murray City, Utah, on the 29th day of June, 1905, it was found that said Murray City, Utah, has within its boundary lines more than 5,000 bona fide residents to wit: 5,536, and application is hereby made to you, to reclassify Murray City, from a third to second-class city. True and accurate copy of the proceedings herein are herby inclosed.
