#### A DRAMATIC INCIDENT.

Japs Unable to Escape from Rus sians Committed Hari-kari,

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 15 .- Advices were received today by the steamship Tre-mont of a dramatic incident during the recent Russia cavalry raid on Yinkow and the Japanese communication south of Liao Yang. A Japanese in-fantry company under Cap. Yasuhara was surrounded by about 3,000 Cossacks near Anshantlen at a commissariat depot. There was a Chinese house near, under cover of which the Japanese made a desperate stand for seven hours. They were driven out and recaptured the Chinese house, driving out a portion of the enemy with bayonets. In the night the Russians set fire to the house and the defenders were compelled to retreat. Cap. Yasuhara and others who vere severely wounded were unable They committed hari-karl and threw themselves in the flames. A surgeon named Hamba was wounded and also failed to retreat. In spite or the fact that a Red Cross band wa attached to his arm, the Russians ar attached to his arm, the cussians arrested the Japanese surgeon and threw him into the flames of the burning house, Several other wounded Japanese were treated in the same way. A lieutenant, a sub-lieutenant and a few men finally effected their retreat to Applantion.

Dimond sets up in his brief that Judge Lacombe of New York granted a writ to John A. Benson under precisely similar circumstances, and also contends that the Washington court is without jurisdiction.

The point of rendezvous with Rojestvensky is not stated, but it is understood that it is beyond the In-dian ocean, Vice Admiral Rojestven-sky being under instructions not to delay into the monsoon period the re-sumption of his cruise.
