

A NEW SAFETY DETONATING FUSE

Maxim, Inventor of High Explosives, Finds One After Ten Years of Experimenting.

CONTROLS THE EXPLOSION.

Has Also Invented a New Smokeless Powder on Which He is Experimenting, Calling It Stabilite.

New York, March 22.—Hudson Maxim, inventor of high explosives, made the dinner tendered Sir Percy Sanderson, retiring British consul, by the Canadian club, tonight, the occasion of the first announcement concerning a new safety detonating fuse which he has invented after 10 years of experimenting, and which he declares, has been the aim of inventors for years. By it, he said, it is possible to send an armor piercing shell through armor and cause it to explode at exactly the distance behind the armor desired by the gunner. It will not matter whether the armor is one inch or 12 inches in thickness, the inventor said.

Mr. Maxim recalled that several years ago he made the Canadian society dinner the vehicle to carry to the world the news of his invention of the high explosive now known as Maximite. Tonight's announcement, he said, marks another step forward in the art of war mechanics and means the final victory over armor as at present, hardened by armor piercing shells.

By the new safety detonating fuse, Mr. Maxim said, he could tell the distance about a new smokeless powder, which he had just begun to manufacture, but which is still in the process of experiment. This new weapon of modern warfare, Mr. Maxim declared, would wipe out, he was convinced, many elements of the danger attaching to the use of smokeless powder.

The speaker prefaced his talk about high explosives by a talk on the comparatively undeveloped seaboard of the Atlantic and Pacific coast of the United States.

The tremendous expense of modern warfare, he said, makes the unprepared nation the only inviting bait. Poor old China is a good sample of what may happen to a nation unprepared to maintain its own peace by being prepared for war. We are relatively as defenseless as China. Suppose some other nation should attempt to force our hand and call our bluff. Thanks to England, she does not call the bluff.

"When the Venezuelan trouble came we put our backs up and showed our teeth. And do you know what the result was?"

"Our capacity, our national capacity, for the manufacture of smokeless powder at that time was one charge for one 30-inch gun each day."

"Now, as a matter of fact, on our Pacific coast we are absolutely defenseless. The Japanese have 750,000 trained veterans and we have 50,000 veterans—who spend their time in shoveling and in waiting on the officers."

"It is true that we have got behind us the great American genius, but while it is getting to work, just as the might capture the Pacific slope, land a quarter of a million troops and occupy California, and California is rich enough in her own right to support the whole Japanese nation."

"In experiments at Indianhead on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week a new detonating fuse, just completed, was used in shells shot through five, six and eight-inch Krupp process armor and exploded the shell behind the armor at the distance that would be most effective."

"It will not matter whether the plate is one inch or 12 inches in thickness. I have been working on the fuse for 10 years. It is possible to adjust the fuse so that it will be utterly impossible for the shell to explode until after it has been fired from the gun. This is highly important in the use of high explosives."

"The new powder is not affected by the impurities. It will not decompose like the ordinary powder. It can be made and used in the same day. It will save from \$300,000 to \$350,000 in interest money to the government annually."

KILLING OF PODHORSKY AT GOLDFIELD BY HINES.

Seattle, March 22.—Count Constantine Podhorsky, who is reported shot and killed at Goldfield, Nev., was probably better known in Seattle than in any other Pacific coast city. He was connected with the Northwestern Siberia company, being their representative in this country. He spent much time in Alaska, where he was extensively entertained whenever he happened to be in that part of the country. He first came in contact with Jack Hines in Nome, where Mr. Hines was connected with the Northwestern Commercial company.

The trouble between Jack Hines and Count Podhorsky is believed by many to have had its origin in Seattle last summer when Mrs. Hines was staying in the city. Mr. Hines was in Alaska, and during Mrs. Hines' stay here Count Podhorsky is known to have paid her much attention, the pair being seen many evenings in the various cafes and places of amusement. Late in the summer Mrs. Hines returned to Nome.

In some way news of the count's attentions to Mrs. Hines was carried to Nome and Mr. Hines, accompanied by his wife, immediately came to Seattle. It is not known why they came, and shortly after their arrival here they disappeared. No word was left as to their destination. The count was seen many evenings after looking about in the cafes, possibly searching for Mr. and Mrs. Hines. Finally, however, he set out for California, intending to go from there to Hawaii. It may be that he had heard of the whereabouts of Mr. Hines and wife, or it may have been merely for business reasons that he decided to change his plans and go to Goldfield. WIRELESS TELEPHONE. EXPERIMENTS SUCCESSFUL.

Berlin, March 22.—Count Arco, in his wireless telephone experiments, has succeeded in obtaining distinct exchanges of words in a tolerable natural voice at a distance of two miles, by using poles 30 feet high, and a distance of 10 miles by using a pole 100 feet high.

Count Arco is a delegate of the United States to the international conference on wireless telephony at Berlin, and Lieut. Commander Howard S. N. the American attaché here, were present at a series of private exhibitions of the telephone apparatus and have been able to talk with each other at a distance somewhat less than three miles.

Prof. Paulsen, the Danish inventor, last December, succeeded in obtaining exchanges of messages by wireless telephony at considerable distances. Count Arco does not regard his discoveries as commercially practical at present, though he hopes to eventually construct an apparatus which will take the place of wires in cities and perhaps in suburban districts.

BROWNSVILLE INQUIRY.

Lieut. Chamberlain Makes an Investigation of the Alleged Grey Confession.

Houston, Tex., March 22.—Lieut. Chamberlain returned to headquarters in this city tonight after spending the day with the Texas State Police, investigating the alleged confession of D. C. Grey with reference to the raid on the town of Brownsville by the negro soldiers stationed there last August.

Lieut. Chamberlain when questioned relative to the report that he had caused the arrest of a negro named William Anderson, denied that any one had been arrested at Galveston, today at the instance of army officers, but said that William Anderson, a former member of the Twenty-eighth infantry, and his uncle, L. C. Grey, were among those interrogated by Maj. Blockman in the office of the chief of police. Further than this, Lieut. Chamberlain would make no statement.

Anderson is said to be the negro who made the confession to two Galveston newspaper men regarding the Brownsville raid, and other officials of that raid have made statements to the effect that Anderson was a member of the negro's army.

TALK OF A PANIC.

Omaha, March 22.—"I take no stock in the talk of panic. I do not think the report of prosperity has been checked. While other men, many of them men whose opinions must be respected, have expressed the belief that present agitation and speculation bearing upon the railroads will inevitably lead to a stringency if not a panic, I do not endorse their views."

This statement was made by President B. L. Winchell of the Rock Island railroad in Omaha this morning, where he and other officials of that road had come on business. He added:

"It is a mistake, though to ascribe the action or conduct of railroad managers at this time to a determination or desire of retaliation. It is nothing of the sort. The same good faith which the people ask for their motives must in turn be ascribed by the people to the motives of the corporation."
