Gessler Rousseau Admits That He Tried to Dynamite the Statue Of Frederic's the Great.

HE INTENDED TO TRY ACAIN.

It Was He Who Placed the Infernal Machine on the Steamship Umbria

Philadelphia, Jan. 15 .- "Gessler Rosseau," who was arrested here on Thursday with an unloaded infernal machine in his possesion, admitted to the police today that he is the man who attempted to destroy the statue of Frederick

the Great in Washington last Tuesday, and also that it was he who sent the trank containing an infernal machine to the British steamship Umbria in

New York in May, 1903. The prisoner made these statements

n the office of Capt. Donaghy of the Philadelphia detective bureau after he had been identified by persons brought here from New York and Washington. He gives no reasons for the attempted outrages except that "there are too many foreign affairs in this country."

After having Rosseau under fire all afternoon the police classed him as "an American patriotic fanatic," The pris-American patriotic function, "The pris-oner gave no information voluntarily admitting only those things which the police had fastened on him. Both the Washington and New York authorities want the man and it is probable that

the will be turned over to the police of the latter city. The apprehension of Rosseau was due to the disappearance of Owen Kelly, a wealthy Irish-American, who is pron-Weathry Hish-American, who is prohi-inent in Irish-American societies in this country. Kelly disappeared on Oct, 25 and from time to time the news-papers have published articles on the mysterious disappearance. These the police belleve attracted Rosseau's at-tention tention.

On Thursday Rosseau called on Paton Thursday Rosseau called on Pat-rick Kelly and offered to take him to his brother in New York for \$500. He said he and Owen Kelly belonged to georet societies that were organized for

the purpose of blowing up British ships in American ports. Patrick Kelly notified the policy and Rosseau was taken into custody. The value he carried contained an infernal machine of the clock arrangement va-riety, but no explosives. About the machine was wrapped a Washington newspaper. This gave the clue that he might know something of the explosion might know something of the explosion at the statue of Frederick the Great, and his picture was taken and sent to both the Washington and New York authorities. ATTEMPT TO MURDER **GENERAL TREPOFF.**

Moscow, Jan. 15 .- At the Nicholas station tonight, while Gen. Trepoff was bidding farewell to Grand Duke Sergius on his departure for St. Petersburg, a young man wearing a student's cap fired three shots from a revolver at the general. All the shots missed Gen. Trepoff. Grand Duke Sergius proceeded on his journey.

Gen. Trepoff, who recently was releved of the office of chief of police of Moscow and ordered to the front to take up his duties at the head of the Red Cross society in Manchuria, in-Red Cross society in Manchuria, in-curred the specal enmity of the stu-dents of Moscow by the severity with which he put down their demonstra-tions of Dec. 18 and 19, 1904. Within one week in 1902 there were three at-tempts on his life. The first of these, on March 31, was by a woman named Allart, a governess, who placed the muzzle of a pistol against Gen. Tre-poff's breast and pulled the trigger, the weapon, however, failing to dis-charge. charge. Four days later a man armed with

the prisoner. He admitted the attempted outrage on the statue. He had manufactured the infernal machine himself, which consisted of a candle, fuse and "dyna-mite engine." Where he made it he would not say. The failure to destroy the statue must have been due to the mathematical status on the fuse or inmelting tallow spoiling the fuse or in-terfering with the dynamite.

terfering with the dynamite. Rosseau then gave the police the in-teresting information that he had in-tended making a second attempt to blow up the statue, this time with a time-clock machine. As it was diffi-cult to get past the sentrics after nightfall he intended going to the ar-senal at about dusk, arrange the in-fernal machine so that it would ex-plode at about midnight and then hang it on the statue. it on the statue. Regarding the sending of the infernal

machine to the steamship Umbria Rosseau said that the police report of all his movements after the Umbria

All his movements after the Umbria incident up to the time they lost track of him was correct. Where he has been between May, 1903, and hast week he will not say, always replying: "That is for you to find out." He said he made part of the Umbria infernal machine in Chicago and then took if to New York in a trunk. In New York he obtained a room at Mrs. Curry's place and there finished the work of making the machine. He ad-mitted writing the note to Police Com-missioner Greene which read: "The Mafia greets you and wishes you well. The society has declared war against England and has ordered the destruction of every ship flying the

the destruction of every ship flying the British flag that sails out of New York. The society has undertaken to clear New York harbor of British ships, and will succeed.

It was this note of warning that led to the finding of the trunk before it was placed on the steamship.

was placed on the steamship. The prisoner was closely questioned regarding the motive for blowing up the Umbria, but was non-committal. He said that he was born in America and that he was a farmer. He admitted his name was not "Gessier Rosseau." He said he had read much and that he was a student of social economy. He took the name of "Gessier Rosseau" because two of his ideals had those names. Albrecht his ideals had those names. Albrecht Gessler, the Swiss dictator, who, tra-dition says, was killed by William Tell in 1307, and Jean Jacques Rosseau, the French philosopher and writer, who died in 1778.

Rosseau will be kept here for the present. As the infernal machine found in his possession was not loaded, he committed no crime. He is held for attempting to extort money from Pairick Kelly under false pretenses An affair like the Umbria incident is a felony, punishable by twenty years imprisonment.

KILLED IN A RUNAWAY.

Detreick Nelson of Blaine. Ida., Was Not Murdered.

Moscow, Ida., Jan. 15.—The man found dead in the road near Blaine, six miles southeast of this place, last night, proved to be Detreick Nelson in-stead of Knud Nelson. Sheriff Rob-bins and Coroner Jamison returned today and are of the opinion that Nelson came to his death from injuries received in a runaway accident, instead of having been murdered, as was at first supposed. No post mortem examination or inquest was ordered by the coroner. Sheriff Robbins is unable to say what was the immediate cause of death.
