## GRAND JURY INVESTIGATION.

Called For by County Democratic Chairman T. D. Johnson to Look Into Election Frauds.

## WILL CLEAR COURT CALENDAR.

Blake Christensen Nuptials—Woodmen Sued for Insurance—Opening of Dee School.

Judge H. H. Rolapp has been petitioned by T. D. Johnson, an attorney and chairman of the Weber county Democratic central committee to call a grand jury to investigate certain alleged election law violations. It will be remembered that the Democratic committee charged before the election that over 100 persons had been illegally registered from the Central hotel and other places and they now want these matters fully investigated.

District Attorney Halverson was seen with reference to the petition of Mr. Johnson and made the following statement:

"I know nothing of any election frauds in this county, but if a grand jury is to be called, I think it should be charged generally to investigate all cases, as well as election frauds if any. I heartily favor the election jury system, and think it should be called at least once a year, if for no other purpose than to investigate the conduct of public officers. It is really the only method to secure evidence in some cases."

Chairman Hulanicki of the Republican central committee stated that he had heard of no election frauds, but that he would be pleased to prosecute any violators of the election laws if there were any. He does not think it necessary to call a grand jury, that if persons have been violated, the sheriff's office is competent to investigate and apprehend the violators and County Attorney Hulanicki will prosecute them.

Judge Rolapp has not decided what time to take on the petition of Mr. Johnson.

## OPENING OF DEE SCHOOL.

The formal opening of the Dee school occurred yesterday at the school building, which was thronged all the afternoon by the parents of pupils and by others interested in the school work. A special exhibit of grade work was shown to the visitors and there were also music and refreshments. This afternoon the teachers of the school will give a reception in honor of President Dee and other members of the board of education and for the other teachers of the city. The reception is set for 2 o'clock.

## TO CLEAR COURT CALENDAR.

Judge Rolapp will on Monday reset all cases that are to be tried in the district court, and that can possibly be reset during his term of office, so that when he is over his office to his successor on Jan. 1, 1905, the business of the court will be cleared up as much as possible.

Pioneer and Veteran of 78 Goes to Well Earned Rest.

Mrs. Hatch has been in rather poor health for several years past and about two months ago was very sick for several days, at which time her friends felt that she was not long for this world. She rallied, however, and has been in her usual health until the last few days. Mrs. Hatch came of a prominent New England family, the Eastmans, and was born at New Paine, Windham county, Vermont, Nov. 4, 1826. Mrs. Hatch has always been a faithful Latter-day Saint, a good neighbor and enjoys the love and respect of all who knew her, and the entire community will extend their sympathies to the family in the loss they have sustained.

The funeral will be held at the Second ward assembly hall at 1 p. m. Saturday, Nov. 12.
