More About the "Pacific."

SAN FRANCISCO, 26.—Benjamin F. Gertz, of Boston and Charles Knight and wife went on board the Pacific at Tacoma and were lost. An anonymous correspondent of the Portland Oregonian, from Tacoma, says that when Captain Howell, of the Pacific, went on board there, he was intoxicated that he had to be led on board; he says that fifty people were eye-witnesses of his condition.

Work Resumed—Marche Disaster.

A dispatch from Virginia says that the new Opbir works began hoisting yesterday from the thirteen hundred foot level.

Yard in connection with the "Pacific" Disaster.

A dispatch from Victoria says that the coroner's jury on the body of Thomas J. Farrell, a victim of the Pacific disaster, found that the Pacific should not have been damaged by a collision with the Orpheus had she been a sound, substantial vessel; that the collision was caused by the Orpheus being improperly cleared across the bows of the Pacific; that the watch on board the Orpheus was insufficient in number to keep a proper lookout, consisting only of the helmsman, one man supposed to be on the lookout, and the third mate, a young man of doubtful experience; that the Pacific had been in two hundred and thirty-eight persons on board; had five boats, whose most carrying capacity did not exceed 100; the boats were not, and could not be lowered by an undisciplined and insufficient crew; that the captain of the Orpheus sailed away after the collision, without trying to ascertain the amount of damage done to the Pacific.

Another Resound Dispatched.

A dispatch from Stannix, Arizona, says that Chavez, the lieutenant of the late band of Yavapai, was shot and instantly killed near there yesterday, while attempting to escape arrest.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Reply of Spain to the U. S.

LONDON, 26.—A special to the Daily Telegraph from Paris states that, in the Spanish reply to the Washington Government, nothing is conceded to the U. S. except that the accused may invoke the aid of counsel before a court martial in Cuba. A telegram from Madrid to the same paper says that so far as can be learned Spain promises reform in the matter of confiscation of property, but declines to adhere to the treaty of 1793.

England and Egypt.

The Times, in its financial article, says in relation to the purchase by Great Britain of 177,000 shares of the Suez Canal Co.—"A breathing time, most essential to Egypt, is secured. The value of the purchase to England is great, and probably will be taken by the public to mean more than it does. In laying up the rest of the shares and paying the two loans raised by the company, amounting to £4,800,000, England would be possessed of the entire property. The advantage of the bargain materially is a secondary question. The purchase was made for political reasons, therefore the importance of this step is hardly to be overrated. For a considerable time it can not be a pecuniary profit, unless England also redeems the 10 years' mortgage which the Khedive herebefore sold."

The Times, in a leading article on the subject has the following—

"There is no audacity about it which we do not generally associate with the acts of the British ministry. We seem to trace in the Egyptian business the same spirit of adventure which was the cause of the Egyptian business. The nation wakes this morning to find that it has acquired a heavy stake in the security and well-being of another distant land; that it will be held by all the world to have entered upon a new phase of Eastern policy. We have no desire for the extension of territory, we do not covet the land of the Nile since the firm of 1823, which gave the Khedive the right of independent action with foreign powers, and may fulfil his duties untrammelled by Stamboul. In this assignment, we desire to make no change but should rather notion of intrigue, or aggression, without or corruption within, bring a political as well as financial collapse in Turkey it might become a serious and dangerous question of the security of that part of the domain of the Sultan which we are and nearly concerned. An acquisition of commanding importance as the Suez Canal, an interest which must inevitably tend to increase, will lead the government and people to take measures for the security of that part of the domain of the Sultan which we are and nearly concerned."
