

## ANGLO-RUSSIAN RELATIONS.

A New and More Friendly Era is Believed to Have Been Inaugurated

### CZAR MAKES THIS QUITE PLAIN

Received British Ambassador in Most Cordial Manner—Misunderstanding Cleared Up.

St. Petersburg, May 26 (6:50 p. m.).—The beginning of a new and more friendly era in Anglo-Russian relations is believed to have been inaugurated by the cordial manner in which the emperor this afternoon at the Tsarsko-Selo palace received Sir Charles Hardinge, the new British ambassador to Russia. Sir Charles presented his credentials in private audience, the emperor shaking with the emperor the cordial greetings extended to the new ambassador, who handed a personal letter from King Edward to his imperial nephew, also conveying the British king's personal good wishes and sincere desire that the relations between the two countries shall become more and more friendly.

While what passed naturally is a secret, Sir Charles afterwards expressed the greatest satisfaction at the spirit of his reception. While it is a mistake to suppose that negotiations looking to an understanding or an adjustment of the long standing differences between Great Britain and Russia have begun or can begin while Great Britain's ally is at war with Russia, it is an open secret that the real end and aim of Sir Charles' mission is to improve the relations between Great Britain and Russia during the war as to render possible at its conclusion such an understanding which is now known to be close to the heart of King Edward. It is said that one of the possible causes of misunderstanding already has been removed by the acceptance by Russia of Great Britain's assurances regarding the purpose of the British mission in Tibet.

New Haven, Conn., May 27.—Five Yale men have created a sensation by walking out of the Yale campus and down Chapel street barefooted.

public morality, and protested against its acceptance by the museum. Signor Biondi declares that he received an offer of \$1000 as compensation for the non-exhibition of the bronze, which he indignantly refused. He asserts that the only redress he seeks is the exhibition of the "Saturnalia," which was awarded the Grand Prix at the Paris exposition of 1889, and of which a replica has been bought by the Italian government and placed in the national gallery in Rome.

### IN A STATE OF TERROR.

A Third Rail Accident Causes Panic Among Passengers.

New York, May 27.—Several hundred persons were thrown into a state of terror by an accident which occurred at the Adams street station of the Union Elevated railroad in Brooklyn, and while there were many narrow escapes, few persons were injured.

Just as a train was pulling out of the station, one of the gates between the second and third cars broke from its fastenings and fell across the third rail. Immediately there was a loud report and a long continued display of electric sparks which fell into the street for nearly a minute. A panic was created among the passengers, and many were knocked down and trampled upon in the rush for the doors.

The train was made up of five cars, two of which caught fire, and several of the wooden ties beneath began to burn. Firemen tried to extinguish the blaze, but the fallen gate continued to act as an electric conductor, and the whole station seemed to be on fire. The circuit was finally broken and the firemen soon had the fire extinguished. Half a dozen passengers were injured.

### Togo Establishes a Blockade.

Tokio, May 27, 1 a. m.—Vice Admiral Togo has now established a complete blockade around the southern end of the Lao Tung peninsula. This completely envelops Port Arthur from the seaward and probably marks the opening of the final investment of the town and its fortifications.

### All Quiet at Vladivostok.

Vladivostok, Thursday, May 26.—Everything remains perfectly quiet in the town and its vicinity. The fog has lifted and the weather is fine.

## MERCHANTS ARE CONSERVATIVE.

They are Buying Very Much Closer Than They Were A Year Ago.

### DISTRIBUTION HAS IMPROVED.

Indications Point to a Heavy Trade in Fall Goods—Crop Outlook Good.

New York, May 27.—Advices from special correspondents of the International mercantile agency indicate that there has been further improvement this week in distribution of merchandise at prominent western centers, and generally better jobbing trade at Omaha and similar points of distribution, where sales are being pushed successfully. Uncertainty has given place to comparative assurance in quarters where new ventures could scarcely obtain a hearing a few weeks ago.

But merchants everywhere are conservative, buying closer than a year ago. In both lines indications point to heavy trade in fall goods. Boots and shoes are passing quickly into the hands of consumers, returns in this line being for the most part abnormally heavy. Enlarged distribution of the food stuffs is noted at Chicago. Tie-up in lake traffic is becoming more serious, with no prospect of lessening congestion and little relief from the railroads. Rail tonnage, in fact, shows a small decrease in territory where the roads might be expected to benefit as a result of the water blockade. New England advices suggest serious interference with general trade unless idle longshoremen resume work at the ports of sound steamers. Other than the lake situation is less troublesome than a year ago, although the laying off of many thousands of employees by the different railroads, involves complications which cannot be accurately reckoned with at this time.

Iron and steel continues to show a halting tendency, with some better movement of pig iron at Pittsburgh and coke production almost at maximum. In finished lines the pine trade is showing marked activity with improved inquiry for boiler tubes, which is suggestive of increased use of steam power.

The weather during the week has been favorable for crops throughout the southwest, west and northwest. Although reports of crop damages come from Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Oklahoma, other sections, notably the Missouri valley, rocky mountains and the Pacific coast have experienced satisfactory temperature. The weather has been rather unfavorable for new cotton in parts of Texas. The situation in other sections of the south is, however, satisfactory. Corn and oats are being harvested in some sections of the state. Rice and sugar cane are in good state, and business governed by crop conditions shows up well in all branches.

### MOSIER FOUND GUILTY.

He Was Tried on Charge of Malpractice.

Philadelphia, May 27.—After short deliberation the jury in criminal court No. 2 has returned a verdict of guilty against David P. Mosier, tried for malpractice. Sentence was suspended pending a motion for a new trial. Bail was denied. Mosier, who was known under aliases and as "doctor" was the witness who testified against a woman who kept a baby farm and who was charged with making away with the infant entrusted to her care. It was he who declared he had seen babies thrown into a furnace in the woman's home. It was alleged that he was a member of an alleged syndicate of baby farmers.

### JAP STUDENT HONORED.

Chosen to Assist in Completing a Chauver Dictionary.

Stanford University, Cal., May 27.—Yasunosuke Fukukita, a Japanese student of Stanford university has been chosen by Dr. Ewald Flugel, head of the department of English philology, to do part of the work in connection with the dictionary of Chauver's works, which will be published in about three years. Dr. Flugel is the first man to undertake an exhaustive research of the subject of Chauver with a view to publishing a complete dictionary, and those who have been appointed to assist him have received a high honor. The selection of a Japanese student is due to the careful and diligent work which Fukukita has done while he has been a student in the Stanford English department. Fukukita has been from Tsu, Japan, and was graduated from Stanford with the degree of bachelor of arts in the fall of the present month. His work with Dr. Flugel will extend over a period of three years.

## POLARITY OF THE ANIMAL BODY

Does Not Exist in the Cells But in the Streaming of Regenerating Processes.

### DR. LOEB ESTABLISHES THEORY.

Was Suggested by Investigations of Du Hamel and Bonnet in Eighteenth Century.

University of California, May 27.—Prof. Jacques Loeb, the biologist, has succeeded through a series of experiments he has just made at the University of California in confirming theories he had long held that the polarity observed in the regeneration of the animal body does not exist in the cells, but in the streaming of regenerating processes of the body, moving from the basal to the oral pole. In the bulletin bearing the title "Concerning Dynamic Conditions which Contribute Toward the Determination of the Morphological Polarity of Organisms," which was issued at the university today, Dr. Loeb gives the results of his experiments. The value of Dr. Loeb's experiments lies in his success in proving with animal bodies the theories that other scientists had advanced after experiments with plant life. In the eighteenth century two investigators, Du Hamel and Bonnet, arrived at the conclusion that certain sap currents are responsible for the fact that in plants at one end of a higher cut-off from a branch an apex rises and at the other end root is formed. Du Hamel assumed that a specific sap causes the formation of roots and that this sap moves basalward in the stem of the plant, while the fluids which give rise to the formation of branches move upward.

Dr. Loeb took his cue from the results obtained by the investigations of these and other scientists. The idea that sap currents are the cause of regeneration and organ formation suggested to him a fruitful field of research. It was the general belief of scientific men then that the individual cells in the animal body are polarized and that there is a certain sap produced at the basal end of organs different from those at the oral end. But the experiments with the plants led Dr. Loeb to believe that the same conditions obtained in animal life.
