

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR JUSTIFIED.

Was the Only Issue in the English
Elections Campaign.

CONSERVATIVE PARLIAMENT

Regret Over Defeat of Mr. Plunkett—
Was a Woman in the Case, So
It Is Said.

London, Oct. 13.—The new house of commons is practically elected, and the conservatives returned to power with a majority that portends that they will remain in office another six years. Justification of the South African war, for that was the only serious issue in the campaign, has been accomplished in less than two weeks, and the election machinery so suddenly put in action is already relapsing into the quiescence of ordinary times. Of the contests that mark this week's polling two attracted particular attention, that which resulted in the defeat of Right Honorable Horace Curzon Plunkett, who ran for the South division of Dublin county in the conservative interest, and that in which Dr. Gavin Brown Clark, the radical candidate for Cathness, was beaten. The conservative journals of England deplore the opposition within their own party which resulted in Mr. Plunkett's down fall, regarding it as a serious omen for the future stability of the unionists in Ireland and significant of a serious lack of toleration on their part which bids fair to perpetuate religious and political strife to the detriment of Ireland's business prospects. While the opposition to Mr. Plunkett was nominally based on his giving avowed home rule a political position, a representative of the Associated Press learns that a most bitter undercurrent of personal feeling has been as much if not more to do with it than the causes which appeared in the papers.

A WOMAN IN THE CASE.

It is once more a case of "look for the woman in the case." Mr. Plunkett has long maintained a great personal friendship for one of the most charming of Dublin women. What caused umbrage at this friendship was the fact that she was an ardent Catholic and home ruler and through her influence, so Mr. Plunkett's unionist opponents believed, he came under the direct influence of Catholic priests. So, all the forces of Protestantism were put to work with the result that a nationalist won the seat so long held by Mr. Plunkett and defeated one of the most important government officials in Ireland. Mr. Plunkett was vice president of agriculture and other technical industries, a commissioner of the congested districts board of Ireland and a commissioner of the colonization board of Ireland and Scotland. He founded and was chairman of the recess committee and of the Irish agricultural organization society.

PUBLIC OPINION ABOUT CHINA.

With those old scores settled, public opinion is finding a chance to air itself about China and the future of the war in South Africa and is looking forward to the day when the troops return home. What glad and enthusiastic scenes will ensue when the men of the war in South Africa and the more serious minded are equally elated over the prospect of the eradication of the abuses and the completion of the army when the populace's idol, Lord Roberts, is once installed in the war office. That those expectations will be fulfilled exactly the way the public, which regards the war office likely to be anticipated from the statement that Lord Roberts has already written to several high officials expressing gratification at again being associated with them. One of those is said to be Gen. Sir Evelyn Wood, the adjutant general of the forces. But, though the clean sweep so much demanded is not likely to occur, it is an undoubted fact that Roberts will have far greater powers than Lord Wolsey and will use them without respect to persons.

ANOTHER YACHT RACE.

The prospect of another international yacht race creates no end of anticipation and interest. It is welcomed as a grateful relief to the tragic happenings which have marked the last few years of the war. The spirit of competition which Sir Thomas Lipton encountered among some of his own people last year and the accusations of self-advertisement do not appear likely to be repeated this time, for the bona fide spirit of his sportsmanship is becoming generally recognized though the bulk of Englishmen are beginning to believe the cup is in America for good. Mr. Cornelius Vanderbilt's refusal to accept Sir Thomas Lipton's cup for 700,000 pounds won by his yacht Rainbow and the circumstances connected with the case cause the yachting papers to comment on it regretfully, though the Yachtsman adds spitefully:

Among the Americans still in London is Senator Wetmore, who is here with his family. Mr. Henry Mayer, the first American caricaturist to make a mark on this side of the Atlantic, is here on his last day. His latest production, a picture story in color, has received the most complimentary notices from the press. Mr. Mayer believes there is a great opening here for American illustrators and caricaturists.

TRIAL OF THE WISCONSIN.

Washington, Oct. 12.—The official report of the trial of the battleship Wisconsin off Lower California, is contained in the following brief telegram received by Secretary Long from Admiral Kautz, commanding the Pacific station at Santa Barbara:

"Wisconsin completed satisfactorily official trip making 17.1 knots, subject to tidal corrections. The secretary also received this morning the following telegram from I. M. Scott, president of the Union Iron Works, in regard to the battleship: "The Wisconsin presents her record 15.4, maximum; average for 32 knots, 17.5; average during trial, 17.25, subject to tidal corrections. A fine, splendid battleship. We congratulate you."

Permits to Travel in Roumania.

Washington, Oct. 13.—Mr. Hardy, the U. S. minister to Greece, has informed the state department that new regulations are now in force in Roumania, requiring aliens traveling or residing in that country to procure permits. These permits are issued only to those who have passports and are valid only in cases which should be viewed at the consulate in Roumania. Foreigners arriving in the country who intend to remain over eight days must procure their permits within a four-hour period. Those rules do not apply to naturalized Roumanians.

American Railroad Cars in Bavaria.

Michigan Legislature Adjourns.

LOOTING OF CHINESE CITIES.

Buyers are Rushing to Peking and
Tien Tsin.

PLUNDER NOT VALUABLE.

Groups of Soldiers Barter the Spoils of War—Rich Fur Robes for Sale—Arms in Abundance.

Tien Tsin, Sept. 7.—[Correspondence of the Associated Press].—Lured by the prospect of rich bargain and loot, large numbers of buyers are reaching Peking and Tien Tsin from Shanghai and other cities in the south.

Most of them are acting under cable instructions from dealers in America and Europe, the most exaggerated reports having been spread of the value of the plunder taken in the sackings of these two north of China cities. It is, of course, impossible to even approximate the total value of the loot secured by the troops. For the greater part of it there is no standard of value, its chief worth lying in the fact that it is loot and as a souvenir of the Chinese trouble it is given a fictitious price. It is safe to predict, however, that Europe and America will be flooded with curious and relics which have never seen the light of day before. So far the speculators have met with keen disappointment. There is today any quantity of stuff for sale, but practically all of it could be bought in any city or oriental shop at home.

In every by-street and in the caverns of the camps soldiers of all the powers gather in little groups bartering the spoils of war. It all done very quietly, and is a department of the business in authority. These little extemporized bazaars are extremely picturesque. Japanese, Americans, Frenchmen, Russians, soldiers of every color, gather in eager groups while civilian traders and curio seekers haggle with them over prices in true oriental fashion. By far the greater portion of the stuff is practically worthless except as has been said, for its value as relics. There are and have been few real bargains and these have been in furs. To the American eye they have proven the most attractive and some exceedingly handsome fur robes have been secured at low prices. Persian lamb and mink, as the dressed hide of the unborn lamb is locally termed, are probably the most valuable of the furs of this region, while some sable and a little ermine has found its way into the hands of those earliest on the scene. As a rule, the robes are openly and fairly sold, very beautifully and elegantly made, and in some cases of good quality. A piece in really first class condition is rare. Most of the robes have been worn or have suffered from the exposure to water and frost. There is a curious absence of bronzes or porcelain. One has a hard time to find a bit of either, and then it is usually of an inferior grade. The soldiers are in a hurry to get rid of the common soldier is not usually a connoisseur in art and many dinky vases of rare value and bits of priceless bronzes probably lie crushed and shattered in the soldier's camp. There are, however, some fine pieces of silver and white metal, pins and rings adorned with cheap enamel and lacquer, are offered for sale in great quantities.

By far the richest loot procured was silver. In the shape of silver, silver shaped ingots are termed. These are worth about seventy taels each in bullion, or from \$40 to \$50 gold. Each bears the imperial stamp on the under face and are the standard of value for the Chinese currency. It sells in the loot market at quite a discount. One buyer from Shanghai told the Associated Press correspondent that he had secured about \$80,000 at a price of \$40,000. A very heavy expense, however, is involved in transporting the size and considerable risk is taken in getting it to market.

There is a half pound of silver, an immense number of Manlicher and Mauser rifles and carbines fell into the hands of the allies and they are a drug in the plunder bazaar. Most of them have never been fired and may bring a good price. Five dollars Mexican or \$2.50 in gold purchases a gun in excellent condition. Single, or the two-men Chinese guns, huge unwarlike affairs, carrying almost a half pound of shot, are plentiful and for the weapon collector this region is a mine of richness.

Silks and embroideries in small quantities are purchasable but they bring good value. All silks and embroideries are natural at judges of textiles. At Peking conditions are practically the same. There, however, were found a larger number of furs and silks. Silver bracelets, pins, necklaces, chains, chains and lockers, are as common as split bottom chairs at home, and the soldiers often eat army rations from inlaid tops of mandarin tables.

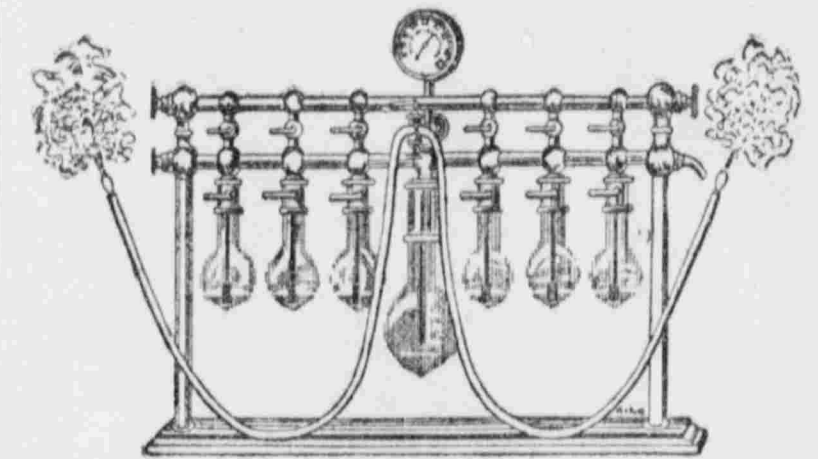
