One has a hard hunt to find a bit of either, and then it is usually of an inferior grade. The explanation is found in the fact that the common soldler is not usually a connelseeur in art and many dinary a connoisseur in art and many dingy vases of rare value and bits of priceless bronze probably the crushed and shattered under the shell-torn walls of the native city here and of Pekin. 
