ENTHUSIASTIC OVER ALBERTA Board of Education - Decrease in School Census - Funerals.

Provo, Utah Co., Aug. 21.—Jesse Knight has returned from Alberta, Canada, where he has spent six weeks looking after large land and cattle in-terests, and helping to advance the sugar factory project. There are now thirty teams at work breaking up the sod on the sugar company's land in order to get it in suitable condition for planting beets in the spring of 1903.
