DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN THE VATICAN.

Broke Out in the Hall of Inscriptions Where the Pope Gives His Audiences.

#### IT CAUSED MUCH CONFUSION.

No Estimate of the Extent of the Damage Can be Formed At Present.

Rome, Nov. 1.-Fire broke out at 8:30 tonight in that portion of the vatican containing the hall of inscriptions. where the pope gives his audience and which is adjacent to the famous Pinacoteca, or gallery of pictures. The alarm caused much confusion and excitement in the vatican. Strenuous efforts were made to control the flames and the firemen of Rome were called to lend their help. At a quarter past 11 the fire was under control. No lives were lost. No idea of the damage can yet be obtained. The pope came to the scene in person and remained until the arrangements to fight the fire were made.

The fire caused greater sensation in Rome than any other event since the death of Pope Leo. The safety of the pope was the first thought in every when the pontiff arrived at the scene he ordered every one to assist in ex-tinguishing the flames. The first intimation of fire was had

The first intimation of fire was had when smoke was seen issuing from the apartment of M. Marle, which is locat-ed above that of Father Ehrie, the lib-rarian, who lived over the library it-self. M. Marle is a celebrated French restorer of ancient manuscripts and il-luminated books; he is at present en-gaged in copying a work, and his first reproductions have been selected for part of the valican exhibit at the St. Louis exposition. The famous Bra-mante staircase leads to that part of the valican where the fire broke out. The gendarmes broke in the doors of M. Marles' apartment and found him in a heavy sleep. It is supposed he re-tired and forgot to take proper precau-tions with his kitchen fire, which prob-ably blazed up and ignited some near-by draperies. The fire started, and it rapidly assumed such proportions that rapidly assumed such proportions that the gendarmes who were the first on the scene gave an immediate general alarm. The whole palace awoke to instant life. The Swiss guards, the papal firemen, gendarmes, priests and domestics all rushed hither and tither in ignorant confusion, asking what was

In ignorant confusion, asking what was the matter, no one knowing where or what the danger was, or what to do. News of the fire was, immediately conveyed to the pope, who found kneeling in his chapel for his usual evening prayer. He insisted on going at once to the scene, notwithstanding the fact that he was begged to think first of his own safety. He was ac-companied by Mgr. Merry Del Val, the papal secretary of state: Mgr. Bisleo, the papal major domo, and Mgr. Del-lichs, and followed by the member of the noble guard attached to his perthe noble guard attached to his per-son. The moment be arrived his mind grasped the gravity of the situation and he ordered that the firemen of and he ordered that the dremen of Rome be called. This was done by telegraph. The firemen arrived in about 10 minutes, and although they brought four engines with them and were at once ready to begin opera-tions, it took some time to find the best way to get sufficient water sup-ply with which to fight the fre. In the meantime the flames had begun to break out of the windows of M. Marles' apartment and were destroying the roof. The flames lighted up the entire district and gave the impresion that nothing could stop their fury. When the fire engines began working three rooms were already entirely destroyed by the flames, which were extending to the other apartments. The pope withdrew as soon as he saw that everything possible was be-ing done. Information had been sent to the Italian authorities. They were courteously invited to enter, and did to the outher apartment. courteously invited to enter, and did so. Therefore, for the first time since the fall of the power of the valican the so. Therefore, for the first time since the fall of the power of the valican the mayor of Rome and even Signor Ronchette, the newly appointed minis-ter of justice, entered the valican in their official capacities. They gave or-ders directing the work in participat-ed personaly in the fight. It was a very difficult fire to overcome: there were a number of old and inflamma-ble objects in the apartment of M. Marle, full of combustibles. crowd. Wiley and his companions were placed betwen a number of police, who had been summoned from Harvey and other nearby suburbs, and a dash was made for a carriage that had been sent for. A severe fight followed, in which the negroes were severely cut and bruised with sticks and stones, but the officers finally managed to get the ne-groes in the carriage, and drove off under a shower of bricks, stones and other missiles. The prisoners were taken to the Englewood jall, where Wiley confessed to having killed Airle.

#### SOUTHERN PACIFIC WRECK One Fireman Killed and Several

#### Of Train's Crew Injured.

Tehama, Cal., Nov. 1,—The first sec-tion of Southern Pacific passenger train No. 15 was wrecked near here this morning. Fireman Morris was killed and several of the train crew were slightly injured. While crossing a trestle about half a mile seat of a treatle about half a mile crossing a treatle about half a mile east of Tehama the treatle gave way. The tender broke loose from the engine and toppled over the treatle, carrying with it two mail cars and a car of scenery belonging to a "Florodora" company. These cars immediataly took for and These cars immediately took fire and were entirely consumed. A baggage car which did not leave the trestle also car which did not leave the treatle also took fire and was burned. By the he-role efforts of the train crew of the first and second sections of No. 15, which had now arrived on the scene, most of the baggage was rescued. About 100 feet of trestle were burned and wreckage of all kinds is strewn along the trestle for a distance of a quarter of a mile.

SPANISH MINERS SCORE A TRIUMPH.

Will No. Longer be Compelled to Live Cooped Up in Barracks Provided by Companies.

WILL BE PAID EVERY WEEK.

#### But They Will Not be Allowed to Organize, Which May Lead to Trouble in Future.

Bilbao, Nov. 1 .- Never in the history of Bilbao has there been a strike of such consequences to the iron workers of Spain as that which terminated to-Value day. The miners will no longer be compelled to live cooped up in the barracks provided by the mining companies, and they will no longer be forced to purchase food from the company 2,433,203 stores, which has often been declared unfit to eat. Instead of being paid by 4,784,100 1,409,500 the month they will hereafter be paid every week. They have been refused, however, the right to organize, and it is bluieved this refusal will lead to trouble in the future. According to statements made by the miners to the 4.611.600 Associated Press and confirmed by their counsel, they have heretofore lived in deplorable conditions. In the mines outside of Bilbao the men were herded into crowded and squalid bar-505,000 rucks

racks. The food sold them at the company stores was sometimes bad, but as they were paid by the month it was almost impossible for them to purchase else-where. The miners were attracted by the propaganda of Socialists and anarchists, and they determined to strike unless their demands for better living conditions were granted. The strike affected 35,000 men. There was not a sufficiency of bread in Balbao, and the miners who poured into the town entered stores and demanded food.

On Wednesday of last week Field Marshal Hernandez saw that strong neasures were necessary and he of-dered the soldiers to disperse the strikers. Some of the strikers poured petroleum on the church of the Jesuits at Balbao and then applied the torch, but the troops extinguished the fire. Refnforced by cavairy the troops suc-ceeded in driving the strikers over the Reinforced by cavalry the troops suc-ceeded in driving the strikers over the San Antonio bridge. The strikers, how-ever, erected barracks at the center of the bridge and in front of a junction of two streets. These barracks were com-posed of pieces of iron work from the bridge, overturned carts and barrels filled with stones. The miners behind the first barri-cade were armed with picks, shovels and revolvers. The cavalry charged across the bridge, but was unable to pass the barricade. Troops were then sent to the right and left of the bridge to flank the miners, and a second

sent to the right and left of the bridge to flank the miners, and a second charge was made. The bridge barricade was held for some moments, but the men there were soon forced to fail back to the second barricade. This the soldiers also ren-dered untenable, and the miners re-treated up the streets, carrying with them some of their wounded, among whom were some women

whom were some women. It is said officially that four persons were killed and 21 wounded during the fighting, but more people were wound-ed than is given out officially.

#### Three Men Burned to Death.

Chester, Pa., Nov. 2 .- Three mer Chester, Pa., Nov. 2.—Three men have been burned to death in a fire that destroyed a boathouse on the Delaware river. They were Lewis Pierce, Samuel Lawrence, and James Campbell. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed that one of the men, rolling over in his sieep, upset a table upon which a lamp was burning. The boathouse was a one-story frame building and was used as sleep quarter. sleep quarter.
