Walkerez Says that He Alone is Guilty of the Crime.

Oakland, Cal., June 9 .- Victor Walkerez, the murderer of Mrs. Lizzie Le-oy, who was arrested yesterday near Hollister, San Benito county, was brought to the city fall here today by Sheriff Hodgkins and Capt. Peterson of the local police, both of whom went to that place for the purpose of bringing him back. Walkerez was greatly de-pressed, but was conscious of the enority of his crime and sought in no way try to mitigate the enormity of the Wisconsin Central
