Treasury Matters.

New York, 21.—The strikes in this city of housemen, cooper and masons are all virtual failures, as for every man that quits work there are ten who are waiting to take his place at any sort of wages. It may be some days yet before the strikers clearly see the mistake in which they have been led by blind leaders, but vacant places are being permanently filled and a hard winter is promised, with less to encourage employers than in any season for the past ten or twelve years. Every trade is full of unemployed workmen, and they are all idle waiting to be ready and anxious to take every place that shall be made vacant, and the question with thousands is not how high wages they can get, but whether they can get any wages at all. Employers are in an equally hard case, and the question with them is not whether they can afford to pay the present wages but whether they can afford to pay any wages. To refuse offered work and to inaugurate strikes in such a season is madness.

Affairs in the South are improving since the election. Already the first English church built within the walls of Rome for public worship, which stands in the Piazza St. Silvestro, and dedicated to the Holy Trinity, was opened Oct. 25, the congregation on the occasion numbering about 180 persons.

Since the recall by the French government of the Orone, the English representative at the Vatican has been withdrawn.

In reply to a address of sympathy from the Catholic congress at Bologna, the Prince of Bismarck said, a short time ago, that the German ecclesiastical laws had been purposely framed to destroy the influence of the church, and to subject priests to the arbitrary rule of a non-Catholic government in order that, in the end, they might be driven from the country. The German government has decided to prosecute the Breslau *Schlesische Volkszeitung*, which copied the archbishop's letter from the *Frankfurter Zeitung*, a paper which they find a most surprising, who is both an Austrian and Prussian prelate, has so far been left undisturbed.
