BIG RUNS ARE RECORDED.

Various Stocks Drop Several Points When Loosened-Iron Blossom Comes Into Play,

Stocks went down the dine when jarred loose to any extent during trading this morning on the local mining stock exchange. ## WHAT EDITOR SAW IN NEVADA HILLS

Car of Rich Ore Shot Down Daily in Tunnel No. 4.

VALUES ARE ASTONISHING. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

> Sixty-five Foot Winze Has Been in Ore Since Started-New Find Made.

After visiting the Nevada Hills last Monday, the editor of the Wonder News wrote as follows: "There were many surprises. Everything is being worked from below now; the ore house on No. 2 tunnel has been torn down and is being erected at the portal of No. 1 tunnel, which has been connected with No. 2, a chute has been put in and hereafter everything will be dropped down to No. 1 and sacked

The ore house at tunnels No. 2 and will be "The ore house at tunnels No. 2 and No. 4 has been abandoned, and will be removed to the lower level; No. 4 tunnel has been connected up with No. 5 at the 140 level, and all the ore from this part of the works will be dropped down to No. 5; the ore house at No. 5 is to be enlarged to twice its present size immediately, as it is now congested, and the workmen are badly hampered. All these changes facilitate the work, and reduce the cost of handling the ores \$2.50 per ton, for the new main roadway passes directly by the platforms at tunnels No. 1 and 5, and the ore is handled but once, being placed on the platform after sacking, and the freighters find it easy loading there. When the railroad puts in its spur a train will take it from these two immense ore houses to the freight cars.

FAVORITES FREELY BOUGHT.

Imparted Better Tone to List and Gains Were Good and Well Distributed-Bonds Irregular.

New York, May 24 .- Prices of stocks leided sharply under the liberal offerings that came from the market in the opening dealings.
