Two of Them Ordained at the Presby.

terian Church Last Night.

Joseph T. Britain of Salina and John C. Lincoln of this city, were ordained ministers in the Presbyterian church last evening, in the First church of this city, before a large congregation. The ceremony was conducted by Rev. Drs. R. G. McNiece, S. E. Wishard and W. M. Paden, Dr. McNiece presiding. Dr. Wishard preached the sermon from the text, "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men." In the course of his remarks the speaker argued that neither colleges or theological seminar-les could make a minister of the gospel. The minister must feel, must know from his inner consciousness that he is called of God to preach His word, and the man's whole life and soul must be in the work. No man from mere intellectual choice would enter a profession where he knew he would be called upon to write two sermons for Sunday, make innumerable calls, visit the sick, and the dying, condole with the afflict-ed, and be ever subject to the strains and calls of every kind that are made continually upon clergymen. Immediately after the sermon, the or-dinance of ordination and the laying on of hands was performed by the three ministers as representing the Utah Presbytery, after appropriate remarks by Dr. McNiece. The latter then de-clared the two young men regularly installed ministers of the Presbyterian Installed ministers of the Presoyterian church, and the charge was delivered by Dr. Paden. The speaker called at-tention to the fact that it was easier to bring Christ to men than it was to bring men to Christ; that to build up was more noble han to tear down, that the clergymen should ever respect con-fidence, not allow himself to be over-come by floods of minor things, and that he should not regard himself too that he should not regard number too seriously. The benediction was pro-nounced by Rev. J. T. Britain. He is the pastor of the Presbyterian church there, while Mr. Lincoln is the assistant pastor of the First church in this city
