LOCAL BRIEFS.

Hot cross buns are appearing in the bakery windows about town with more or less attractive advertising.

The first ball of the Danish, Swedish and Norwegian brotherhood, will be held this evening in Scandinavian hall.

The dance scheduled by the young people of the Unitarian society for Monday, April 24, will take place instead on Tuesday evening, April 25th, at Lily hall.

The young people's evangelized societies in town have raised a fund with which to purchase flowers for the Christian Endeavor society at the state prison next Easter morning.

The state board of pharmacy is holding examinations today for applicants for pharmaceutical certificates. There are 16 taking the examinations.

The city treasurer is today paying off the department payrolls of the city for the first half of the month. The total amount of the same is \$9,257.42.

The Elks will initiate 10 new members next Wednesday evening. The athletic part of the program will be followed by a musical part which will be better appreciated by the novitiates.

The state board of health announces that smallpox is epidemic at Levan, Juab county, and the entire village is quarantined. There are 35 cases reported, among the population of about 600.

The county commissioners have authorized County Clerk Eldredge to advertise for bids for sprinkling the county roads during this season. The bids will be opened on May 1, and the work will begin May 15. Three new sprinkling machines will be added to the former lot making a set of four districts throughout the county.

WILL DRAW UP NEW FRANCHISE.

Assistant City Attorney to Draft One Embodying Changes Made By the Committee.

FORFEITURE CLAUSE REMAINS.

Benefits of New Inventions to be Shared Equally—Deed to Water Rights.

The work of considering, correcting and amending the new franchise for the Utah Light & Railway company was contemplated by the special water and municipal laws committees yesterday afternoon and another draft of the franchise will be made by Assistant City Attorney Bramel, which will embody the changes decided upon by the committees at their various meetings. It is very probable that the franchise will be considered at the adjourned meeting of the city council Wednesday evening.

The much-talked-of forfeiture clause will remain in the franchise. It will apply only to the company's street railway franchises and will be amended so as to provide that the city shall first obtain a decree of the court declaring the franchise forfeited.

The committee also adopted a section submitted by Judge Young providing that the benefits of all new inventions in the matter of light, power and gas, which would tend to reduce the cost of such utilities, shall be shared equally by the citizens and the company.

The representatives of the company agreed to give the city its power rights in Big Cottonwood creek and also give a warranty deed to the land along the banks of the stream which the city wants. Upon suggestion of Atty. Allen T. Sanford, who represented the Citizens' committee, Judge Young agreed to furnish a good and sufficient bond to secure the title of the land. The city engineer will furnish a description of the land wanted.

Shortly before the committee completed its work Councilmen A. J. Davis and Hobbay left the meeting with the remark that there was no use of the minority staying if they could not get even one concession from the majority. Fernstrom replied that if they would suggest something sensible they could get it in.

At the conclusion of the meeting the committee arose and will submit its report to the council without delay.
